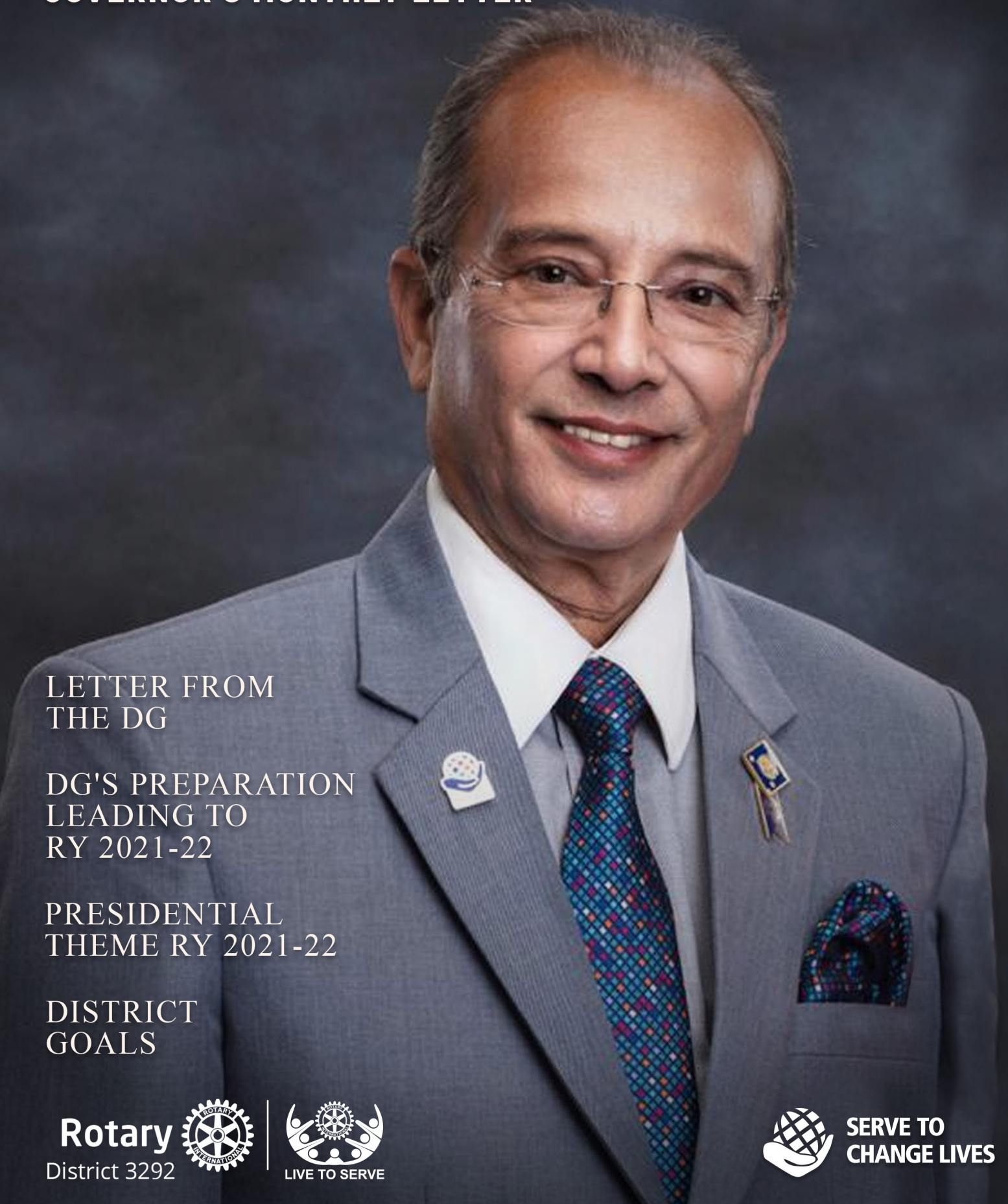

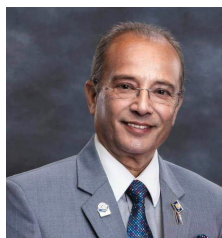

LIVE TO SERVE

RI Presidential Theme



Rotary International President Shekhar Mehta, revealed the 2021-22 presidential theme “Serve to Change Lives”, to Incoming district governors on February 1, 2021 during the Rotary International Assembly. The assembly was originally set to take place in Orlando, Florida, USA, but was held virtually because of the COVID-19 pandemic.



Mehta, inspired the District Governor Elects with a guiding mantra of “do more and grow more.” “Do more” as in bigger and impactful service projects, and “grow more” as in increasing our membership and expanding the participation. He also challenged to reach the membership target of 1.3 million by July 2022 and at the same time gave the mantra of “Each One, Bring One”

Mehta spoke about the influence of Rotary moto: Service Above Self in his life and explained about how participating in service projects through Rotary changed him as a person and made him empathize more with the needs of others.

He says, “Rotary kindled the spark within me to look beyond myself and embrace humanity,” he said. “Service became a way of life for me and I, like many others, adopted the guiding

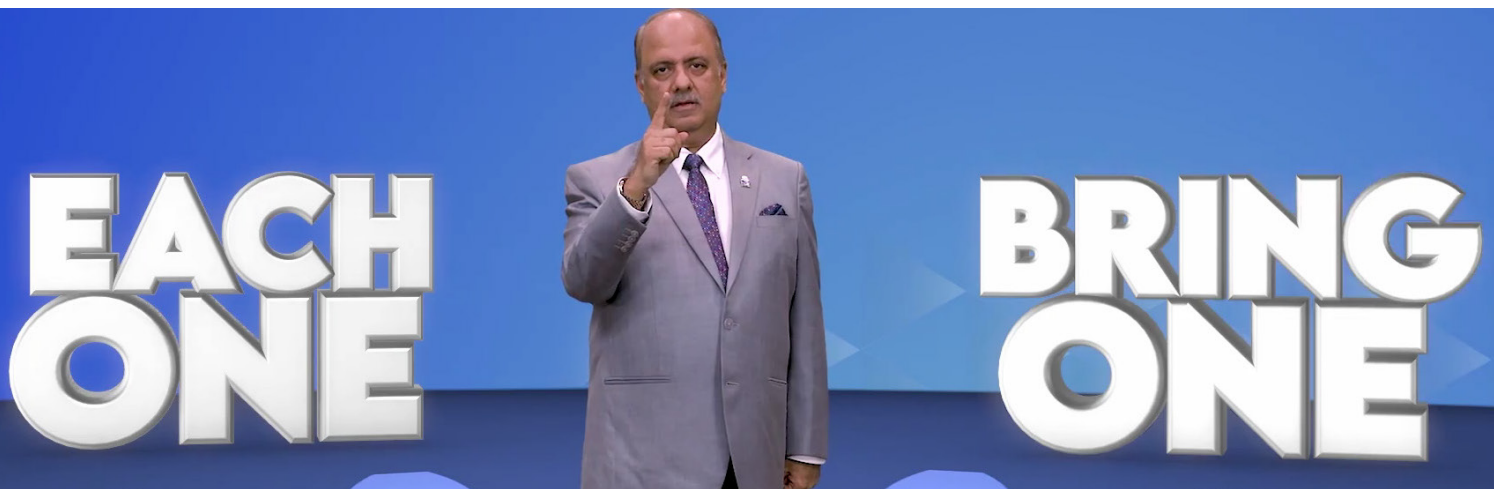
philosophy that ‘Service is the rent I pay for the space I occupy on this earth, and I want to be a good tenant of this earth.’”

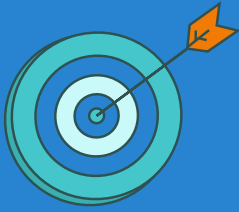
Mehta described how a Service rendered by a single project can Change Lives- “One project in Nepal changes the lives of a few thousand people, the family health program in Africa has served millions of people, a water project in Haiti has changed the lives of more than 10 million people. Back home in India, the T-E-A-C-H program of literacy and education has impacted the lives of millions of children.”

He urged the change maker Governors to serve people and help to change their lives -I urge you to lead by example and inspire Rotarians and Rotaractors to participate in projects that have a sustained impact. Join hands with other Rotarians, other organizations, corporations, and do projects that impact your community, your city — projects that can change lives of people across the country and around the world.

For the 2021-22 Rotary year, Mehta wants clubs to focus their efforts on empowering girls and ensuring their access to education, resources, services, and opportunities so that future generations of women leaders will have the tools they need to succeed. Mehta asked members to use Rotary’s belief that diversity, equity, and inclusion is critical in all we do as a compass to guide this work.

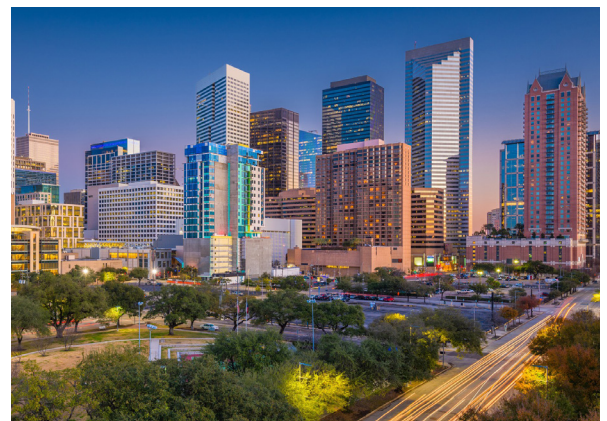
2022 RI Convention Countdown Begins!



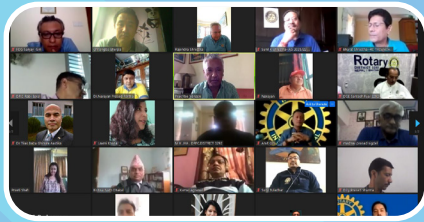
Houston calls itself “the city with no limits,” and when you attend the 2022 Rotary International Convention, 4-8 June, you will see what that means. It is a city of big numbers: Houston covers more than 600 square miles, and with 2.3 million residents, it’s the fourth-largest city in the United States. The metropolitan area’s 7 million people speak at least 145 languages; Houston is by some measures the most diverse metropolis in the country.

The city contains more than 300 parks, with some 40,000 acres of parks and green space. It’s a hub of entrepreneurship; more than 250 early-stage software and digital technology companies call downtown Houston home. It’s also a center of biomedical research: The Texas Medical Center is one of the largest hospital campuses in the world, employing more than 100,000 people.

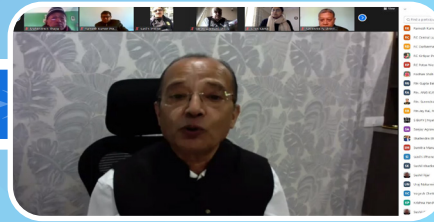
And, of course, Houston is home to NASA’s Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center, which has been one of the country’s centers of space flight for more than 50 years. Home to the U.S. astronaut corps, it continues to foster innovative space research. While you are in Houston, make time to visit Space Center Houston, NASA’s official visitor center, which offers a variety of educational exhibits and programs about space exploration.
