RI President's Message

A quarter of the Rotary year is now behind us. I am sure you are helping Rotary to grow more and do more. And I hope you already have done your part for the Each One, Bring One initiative by introducing one person to Rotary.

Do you ever think about your earliest days as a Rotarian? I often do — because those first moments of discovering the power of service shaped who I am today. When I joined my Rotary club, our efforts focused on India's rural communities, where people were living without toilets, getting their drinking water from the same pond they bathed in, and sending their children to outdoor classrooms set up under a tree. The nearest health care provider often was miles away — and the services were inadequate. But after Rotary clubs carried out some service projects, the villages had toilets, clean drinking water, a classroom for early learning, and a nearby health care center.

The spark that Rotary kindled within me forced me to look beyond myself and embrace humanity. It made service a way of life and led me to a guiding principle I still stand by: Service is the rent I pay for the space I occupy on Earth.

If you feel the need to reignite the spark of service in yourself or your club, October — Community Economic Development Month — is a great time to do so. When we work to improve the lives of people in underserved communities — through, for example, projects that provide vocational training and access to financial resources — we help build and sustain local economic growth.

The need is great. According to the United Nations, 9 percent of the world's population — that's 700 million people, a majority of them in sub-Saharan Africa — live on less than \$1.90 a day. By supporting strong community development as well as entrepreneurs, we can help improve conditions for people in that region and others.

Your club can also promote economic development in your own community by expanding vocational training opportunities through local schools and community colleges, partnering with lenders to improve access to financial services, or working with a nonprofit that provides resources to entrepreneurs and connects them with the business community.

Of course, developing strong communities is impossible without strong public health. On 24 October, World Polio Day, we'll celebrate our tremendous progress in the effort to eradicate polio. But we also know the fight is not over. We still need your help raising funds and awareness to ensure that all children are immunized against polio. Service has been rewarding for me throughout my life. I know the same is true for many of you. Join me this month in becoming a good tenant of our planet by helping others to better themselves and their communities. Together, we can Serve to Change Lives.

DISTRICT STRATEGIC PLANNING UPDATE



For the Rotary Year 2021-22, the DSPC have conducted Training of Trainers (ToT) event on May 22, 2021 and series of Regional Workshops in the month of June 2021 in all seven regions in order to orient all the Seven Regional Coordinators (RCs) and

Thirty five Assistant Governors (AGs) and the club Presidents and officials for formulation of Strategic Plans at club levels. Due to Covid-19 restrictions, all events were virtual with good participation and interaction from the participants. The events were graced by DGE Santosh Rijal, DGN Jitendra Rajbhandary and DGND Rajendra Dhoju, District Trainer PDG Sanjay Giri and other PDGs. All of the leaders have voiced that Strategic Plans to be very simple and doable and clubs to be encouraged and motivated to prepare and implement. The DSPC team under the chairmanship of Prof. Dr. Bishwa K Maskay is putting their best efforts with the coordination and support from RCs and AGs and reaching to the club levels for ownership. This has to be institutionalized in order to make club activities in continuation of club level leaderships in 3 years or 5 years' time period. The DSPC is trying for 100% club prepare and implement Strategic Plans (SPs). The DSPC has also formed monitoring and evaluation team as well as a committee for conducting workshop for newly formed clubs so as to support in preparation of SPs.

Gordon R. McInally elected RI President RY 2023-24

Gordon R. McInally, a member of the Rotary Club of South Queensferry, Lothian, Scotland, is the selection for President of Rotary International for 2023-24. He will be declared the president-nominee on 1 October if no challenging candidates have been suggested.

McInally lauded Rotary's ability to adapt technologically during the COVID-19 pandemic, saying the approach should continue and be combined with the best of our past practices as Rotary seeks to grow and increase engagement.

The best way to increase membership is engagement, according to McInally. To better support clubs, he says, Rotary International, regional leaders, and district teams all need to engage with them. Engagement through social media will reinforce Rotary's brand and showcase the opportunities that come with it. And, he says, engagement with governments, corporations, and other organizations will lead to meaningful partnerships.

With better engagement, McInally says, "We will grow Rotary both by way of membership and in our ability to provide meaningful service." He adds, "Membership is the lifeblood of our organization. I would encourage the use of the flexibility now available to establish new-style clubs that would appeal to a different demographic."

McInally, a graduate of dental surgery at the University of Dundee, owned and operated his own dental practice in Edinburgh. He was the chair of the British Periodontics Society and has held various academic positions. He has also served as a Presbytery elder, chair of Queensferry Parish Congregational Board, and commissioner to the church's general assembly. A Rotary member since 1984, McInally has been president and vice president of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland. He has also served Rotary International as a director and as member or chair of several committees. He is currently an adviser to the 2022 Houston Convention Committee and vice chair of the Operations Review Committee. McInally and his wife, Heather, are Major Donors and Benefactors of The Rotary Foundation. They are also members of the Bequest Society.








Rotary Image Matters

Rotary is one of the largest and oldest service organizations, that we try to attract good people and equip them to be even better, and that we are all about doing good works in our local communities. The way we talk about Rotary and our club shapes the public's perception of who we are, what we do, and why we do it. A strong public image ensures communities everywhere know that Rotarians are people of action, driven by a desire to create opportunities,

strengthen societies, and find solutions to the tough challenges that affect communities and the world.



Over the past few years, Rotary has undertaken an unprecedented amount of research to study the effectiveness of how we communicate with each other and to look at perceptions about the organization from the community at large. Global research shows that when asked 4 in 10 people have never heard of Rotary, another 4 know Rotary in name only, and the remaining 2 have some familiarity, which is often coloured by misconceptions. The results of research further show that Rotary possesses the strengths necessary for greatness in our service. However, when we looked at awareness about Rotary in the greater public arena, they quite simply do not know about us. The public understanding of who we are, what we do, and the value we bring to communities is concerning low. Now, it is time to communicate its differentiated approach and impact to its audiences.



Rotary as a Brand

It is true that logos visually communicate an organization's brand. A brand is more than a logo.

Rotary's brand is much bigger than its wheel. It is a perception: it is how others think about us, not just how we see ourselves. Our brand reflects who we are as well as who we want to be. People's perception of Rotary comes from their experiences with our clubs and programs, along with the stories we tell and the images we share. Consistent brand communications together with a great experience can strengthen our brand and help us engage and attract more members, donors, and partners.

Club Public Image Committee

The public image committee is a one of the five-standard committee of the club. It develops and carries out a plan to keep the public informed about Rotary and club's projects and activities. As far as possible the members for public image committee must be coherent, enthusiastic, experienced, and knowledgeable about Rotary and club. Enhancing club's public image requires time, effort, and planning.

Refresh Club Image

Club's image can be refreshed keeping following considerations in mind:

- Being sure communications accurately represent the club experience. Ensure that club meetings live up to the expectations you have set. A vibrant club image will not boost membership if it does not reflect reality.
- Reminding members that they represent club, and that everything they do contributes to the club's image. Their activities outside of Rotary are an opportunity to attract new members and promote club's culture.
- Updating social media pages, club website, and blog to be more appealing. Make sure club's contact information is easy to find. Club can download graphics and banners on Rotary's Brand Centre.

Our Image Matters

Images play an integral part in telling Rotary's story. It is immensely important on how we present ourselves to the public. So, selection of appropriate photos that reflect Rotary's work and membership or show Rotarians as People of Action during publicity is important. For more than 100 years, Rotary has united leaders who were committed to using their expertise to act and improve their communities. Hence, our stories should be appealing to the people and make them understand what Rotary does, how Rotary is different, and why our work matters to make world a better place to live. Without this understanding, we cannot reach our full potential and bring more people together and improve the life of needy communities worldwide. No other organization is quite like Rotary. Raising our unique voice consistently in all our messaging, we can ensure that our communications reflect our distinct character. If we speak, write, and design in one voice, our communications will sound, read, and look unmistakably like Rotary. This will give our audiences a better understanding Rotary as "service above self".

Conclusion

Hence, the Rotary Public Image and branding is greatly important to make its activities and services visible to the people. People's perception of Rotary comes from their experiences with our clubs and programs, along with the stories we tell and the images we share. Consistent brand communications together with a great experience can strengthen our brand and help us engage and attract more members, donors, and partners. Thus, improving the public image is not only the role of public image committee but every Rotarian and it is equally important to inform the public about Rotary and Rotarian act differently to bring positive outcomes.

Rotary Peace Fellowship Update



Rotary International and District Rotary Peace Fellowship (RPF) Subcommittee sent out emails to all clubs in February with a call for applications for Rotary Peace Fellowship. The

deadline for submitting the applications was May 15 and all applications were to be made online. Rotary International Peace Centre sent the list of applicants from District 3292 on June 1. The online lists of applicants were available only to District Governor, District Rotary Foundation Committee Chair and District Rotary Peace Fellowship Subcommittee Chair (2020-2021). The District had to conduct the interviews of all applicants and send the endorsement by July 1.

There are Six Rotary Peace Centers operating with seven premier universities in six countries around the world (in USA, the peace center is associated with two universities). Each Rotary Peace Center offers its own customised curriculum and field based learning opportunities that examines peace and conflict theory through various frameworks. Five of the peace centers offer Master's Degree while one in Bangkok offers Professional Development Certificate. The following are the lists of Rotary Peace Centers :

- 1. Chulalongkorn University, Bangkok, Thailand offers Professional Development Certificate
- 2. Duke University and University of North Carolina, USA (Master's Degree)
- 3. International Christian University, Tokyo, Japan (Master's Degree)
- 4. University of Bradford, Bradford, West Yorkshire, UK (Master's Degree)
- 5. University of Queensland, Brisbane, Australia (Master's Degree)
- 6. Uppsala University, Uppsala, Sweden (Master's Degree)

This year there were 17 applicants from our district - !3 from Nepal and 4 from Bhutan. Out of the 13 Nepalese applicants 9 applications were for Master's Program while 4 for Professional Development Certificate program and all 4 applicants from Bhutan had applied for Master's. This year also, it was not possible for conducting the interviews with physical attendance due to the Covid-19 pandemic. RPF Subcommittee Chair Rtn. Nirmal Siddhi Bajracharya with the permission of District Governor Rtn. Rajiv Pokharel and District Rotary Foundation Chair Rtn. Mithilesh K. Jha arranged for online interviews with the applicants. The applicants were asked questions on their reason for applying, their commitment to peace and development, their future contribution to the nation and Rotary, their knowledge of Rotary and other specific questions related to individual applicants.

The following applicants were found to meet the criteria and were competent enough for endorsement by our district. The list of names of applicants who received a positive 'Yes' for district endorsement are as follows:

The above endorsement by the district does not guarantee affirmation of scholarship and the final decision is sent to us sometime in November by Rotary Peace Center which is done on a worldwide competitive review process.

Nepal has been awarded Rotary Peace Fellowship regularly for the past five years and more and we hope the trend continues this year also. Last year also we interviewed 21 applicants and endorsed a dozen candidates 5 for Professional Development Certificate (PDC) and 7 for Master's degree and Nepal received 2 for PDC and 1 for Master's program as follows:

EGG BANK SUPPORTING NUTRITION



The Home of Rescued and Afflicted Children Nepal (HORAC) in Taudah, Kathmandu, Nepal is providing shelter to 35 conflict-afflicted children from all over the country. Rotary club of Kopundol (RCK), in collaboration with Rotary Club of London and Farrington, has been supporting HORAC Children's Home since 2014 through supplies of stationaries and education materials continuously. Since children's learning was negatively impacted due to the COVID-19 pandemic, RCK in collaboration with London Rotary has provided two tablets (model A7 2020 edition) to facilitate their virtual learning. Children are very happy that they got to learn new technology to do their daily schoolwork, hence enhance their ability to learn better.

This is the third occasion of Covid Relief food support to HORAC by RCK since July 2020.





TREE PLANTATION

On July 30 and 31 2021 Rotary Club of Kopundol, in collaboration with Rotaract Kopundol, organized a 'Tree Plantation Program' at UN Park Kopundol to beautify the landscape and also restore the ecosystem of the park. The Divisional Forest Office was also present in the Programme. Six RCK Rotarian and eight Kopundol Rotaractors participated in planting the different saplings such as Kapur (Cinamomom camphora), Jamun (Syzygiun cumini), Kainyo (Gravelia robusta), Bottlebrush (Callistemon lanceolatus), Sirish (Jacaranda minosifolia), Bay Leaf/Tejpatta (cinnamomum tamala), Gauva (Psidium guajava), Dhupi (Juniperus indica) and many others suitable for the mid hills of Nepal. A total of 140 tree saplings were planted in the UN park, Kopundol.

The Rotary and Rotaract clubs of Kopundol have taken the responsibility to monitor the plant and curing and nursing the new plants to ensure 100 percent survival of the samplings and their full growth.

OPEN BLOOD DONATION CAMP

On September 04, 2021, Rotary Club of Mount Everest Lalitpur, and Swavalamban Multipurpose Cooperative Ltd. jointly organized an open blood donation camp at Sanigaun, Latipur. It is because the hospital patients are currently facing a shortage of blood during this ongoing Covid-19 crisis. About 50 people showed up at the venue from 11 AM to 2 PM but only about 21 people were eligible to donate. Nepal Red Cross Society provided medical assistance. They screened and selected the blood donors, took their blood, and safely stored it for transporting. The donors received two certificates: one certificate was from Nepal Red Cross Society and another was jointly from Rotary Club of Mount Everest Lalitpur, Rotary International District 3292 Nepal-Bhutan, and Swavalamban Multipurpose Cooperative Limited. The event was successful and the collected blood has helped the patients a lot.



PET STERILIZATIONS PROGRAM

Rotary Club of Biratnagar Fusion identified a unique problem! A problem of rampant street dogs and them not getting food. This made them think- It is better not to be born instead of dying of Hunger! On these lines, getting the street dogs spayed was the right thing to do. So, they partnered with like minds in this endeavor and undertook a Pet Sterilizations program and then feeding them. They have supported more than 200 dogs and have been feeding them twice a day for a week. RC Biratnagar Fusion is reaching out to like-minded friends who can support in continuing this Nobel program.



AMARAULI GLOBAL GRANT



RC Narayangarh organized a kickoff meeting Amarauli Global Grant Project of Pure drinking water, agriculture and sanitation program dated 3 September 2021. The partners of this project were RC Londonderry and RC Limavady. The past DG of district 1160 Rtn. Haward Saski was presented virtually in the program. This project will benefit 173 households of Madi Municipality Ward no.4 and cost NPR 10,000,000.

In 1922, U.S. Rotarians organized an attendance contest; the challenge was that the losing clubs would join in giving the winning club a prize. The Rotary Club of New York City was declared the winner and to them was awarded as a prize a bell from a popular I boat, which was placed on wood that came from HMS "Victory". Admiral Nelson's vessel at the battle of Trafalgar. Since then, the bell used in Rotary meetings started to represent, as on the ships, order, discipline and the time to guide us through the weekly hour and a half meetings. The bell informs us with its sound the beginning of the Rotary meeting, at which time people present should stand, same as at the end, in order to salute the national and Rotary flags. The gavel symbolizes the authority invested in the Rotarian elected to the highest position in Rotary, and through him, reminds those present of his authority. When presidents transmit their positions to their successors at the end of their mandate, they give the bell their last hit turning the gavel over to their successor, symbolizing the transfer of authority.







ORIENTATION PROGRAM





NARAYANI RIVER BANK CLEANING


