Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) in Nepal:

Progress, Challenges and Opportunities

Introduction:

Access to clean water, proper sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) is fundamental to human health, economic development, and social well-being. In Nepal, the WASH sector has seen significant progress in recent years, yet considerable gaps remain. With the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) guiding development efforts, Nepal aims to ensure universal access to WASH services by 2030. This article explores the status of WASH in Nepal, compares it with other South Asian countries, and discusses the role of the government, development partners, NGOs, and international partners like Rotary International in addressing the challenges.

Status of WASH in Nepal:

Nepal has made strides in improving water and sanitation coverage, particularly after the declaration of an Open Defecation Free (ODF) status in 2019. However, sustaining these achievements and addressing disparities remains a challenge as there are slip offs of the ODF status.

Water Supply Coverage

As per government data, around 95% of Nepal's population has access to basic drinking water services. However, only 27% system have treatment facilities and 19% population have access to safely managed drinking water, meaning water that is free from contamination and available on premises. Rural areas, particularly in the hilly and mountainous regions, still struggle with inadequate water supply infrastructure and water quality issues.

Sanitation Coverage

Nepal has achieved near-universal basic sanitation coverage, with over 90% of

households having access to toilets. However, safely managed sanitation, which involves proper disposal or treatment of human waste, remains at only 28%. Many toilets lack proper waste management, leading to environmental and health risks.

Hygiene Practices

Handwashing with soap is a critical indicator of WASH success. While Nepal has improved access to handwashing facilities, gaps persist, especially in schools and healthcare centers. According to reports, only 56% of schools have basic handwashing facilities, which affects hygiene education and disease prevention.

The SDG Agenda and Nepal's Commitment:

Nepal has committed to achieving SDG 6, which aims to ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all by 2030. The government's National WASH Plan aligns with this goal, focusing on improving water quality, waste management, and equitable access. However, achieving these targets requires overcoming challenges such as infrastructure gaps, financial constraints, and climate change impacts and climate-related disaster risks. Nepal's mountainous geography makes water distribution complex, while urban expansion and population growth strain existing sanitation facilities. The challenges in hygiene includes behavioral change and communication and attitudinal aspects and also capacity building at various levels.

Gaps and Challenges in WASH Implementation:

Despite progress, Nepal faces multiple challenges in WASH implementation:

- 1. Water Quality Issues: Contamination of water sources by arsenic, fecal matter, and industrial pollutants is a major concern, particularly in the Terai region.
- 2. Inadequate Infrastructure: Rural and remote areas lack proper water supply and sanitation infrastructure, making it difficult to sustain ODF achievements.
- 3. Climate Change Impact: Floods, landslides and droughts affect water availability and sanitation systems, making WASH interventions more challenging.
- 4. Financing and Resource Constraints: Government funding for WASH is limited, and private sector investment is insufficient. Moreover expenditures of project funds also slow due to procurement and other issues.
- 5. Behavioral Change and Awareness: While toilets have been built, behavioral change regarding hygiene and waste disposal needs more emphasis.
- 6. Capacity Building: Inadequate skilled human capital is big issue at all 3 tiers of government, specially at the local level.
- 7. Urban Sanitation Crisis: Rapid urbanization is outpacing sanitation infrastructure, leading to poor waste management and increased health risks in big cities like Kathmandu valley, Biratnagar, Birgunj, Nepalgunj, Bharatpur, Pokhara etc..

Role of Government, Development Partners and NGOs:

Government Initiatives

The Government of Nepal plays a crucial role in WASH through policies, plans, investments, and regulatory frameworks. Key initiatives include:

- National Sanitation and Hygiene Master Plan (2011)
- WASH Plans
- NWASH database
- Water Supply and sanitation ACT 2022
- Drinking Water and Sanitation Regulations 2025
- Water Supply and Sanitation Sector Development Plan (2016-2030)
- Integrated WASH programs in collaboration with local governments and international donors

The government also works towards capacity building at the local level, ensuring sustainable WASH services in rural and marginalized communities.

Role of Development Partners and NGOs

Several international agencies and NGOs contribute significantly to WASH efforts in Nepal:

- UNICEF and WHO: Support government policies, provide funding, and assist in emergency WASH response, Water Safety Plans, WASH in HCFs and Wash in Schools.
- WaterAid Nepal: Works on improving WASH access in marginalized communities and schools.
- Rotary International: Plays a key role in community-driven WASH projects, funding clean water initiatives, and building sanitation facilities in schools (Girl Child Toilets) and healthcare centers.
- USAID, Asian Development Bank and World Bank: Provide financial and technical assistance for large-scale infrastructure projects.

These organizations help bridge funding gaps, introduce innovative solutions, and promote community engagement for sustainable WASH practices. There are also many organizations like SNV, UN Habitat, WHH, Wine to Water and many NGOs active in WASH sector.

Comparison with other South Asian Countries:

Nepal's WASH progress is commendable but still lags behind some neighboring South Asian countries:

- •India: Has made significant progress through the Swachh Bharat Mission, achieving 100% ODF status and improving urban sanitation infrastructure. However, water quality issues persist.
- •Bangladesh: Leads in innovative sanitation solutions and community-led hygiene programs, with over 98% sanitation coverage.
- •Pakistan: Faces similar challenges to Nepal, including water scarcity and urban sanitation issues.
- •Sri Lanka: Has one of the highest WASH coverage rates in South Asia, with almost 95% access to clean drinking water and effective sanitation management.



While Nepal has achieved good sanitation coverage, safe water and waste management systems need further development to match regional leaders like Bangladesh and Sri Lanka.

Opportunities and Way Forward:

To achieve SDG 6 and ensure universal WASH coverage, Nepal must focus on the following: 1.Investment in Infrastructure: Expanding piped water supply, water treatment systems, sewage treatment, and solid waste management, especially in urban areas. 2.Stronger Policy Implementation: Enforcing regulations on water quality and sanitation to prevent contamination and improve health outcomes.

3.Private Sector Involvement: Encouraging businesses to invest in WASH, particularly in water filtration technologies, chlorination system and sustainable sanitation solutions.
4.Climate-Resilient WASH Programs:
Developing systems that withstand natural disasters and climate impacts.
5.Education and Behavioral Change:

Enhancing awareness programs to improve hygiene habits, especially among school children and healthcare workers.

6.Partnerships with NGOs and Communities: Engaging local communities and international NGOs like Rotary International to implement localized WASH solutions.

Conclusion:

Nepal has made substantial progress in WASH, but challenges remain in achieving safe water, improved sanitation, and better hygiene practices for all. Addressing infrastructure gaps, securing adequate funding, and strengthening multi-sector collaboration will be crucial in reaching SDG 6 by 2030. With a concerted effort from the government, NGOs, development partners, and the private sector, Nepal can ensure sustainable and equitable WASH services, improving public health and overall well-being for its citizens.

Rotary District 3292 Nepal Bhutan can play a significant role with the support from Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation and can make a difference to WASH sector development in Nepal.



Event Proceedings

Past Rotarian Gopal Raj Bhandari (1921–2008) was one of the founding members of the Rotary movement in Nepal, dating back to 1957. His unwavering dedication to Rotary services earned him Rotary International's highest honor, the "Service Above Self" Award, in 2001. His relentless efforts to establish a separate Rotary District in Nepal by July 2008 cemented his legacy as the Patron of Nepal's Rotary District.



My Transformative Experience at the 2025

Rotary International Assembly

Binod Koirala, District Governor, 2025-26 Rotary International District 3292 Nepal-Bhutan

Recently, I
participated in the Rotary
International Assembly,
which was exclusively for
District Governors-Elect
and their spouses. The 2025
RI Assembly was held at
the Risen Shingle Creek
Hotel in Orlando, Florida,
from February 9th to 13th.
The assembly was one of
the most productive and
transformative experiences
of my life.

I gained many key takeaways from the event, but the following points were the most memorable and important to me:

- 1. The true international spirit of Rotary was on full display in Orlando. After the RI Convention, this may have been the largest international gathering of Rotarians. Although the number of delegates at the Assembly was smaller than at the RI Convention, we had numerous opportunities to meet and interact with batchmates and facilitators during breakout sessions and coffee breaks, which was both fascinating and exciting.
- 2. President Mario was outstanding in his delivery, interactions, and the way he presented himself. I feel lucky to be serving under such a true, magnetic leader who has a clear vision. And what a personality... a true hero!
- 3.Mario's Presidential message was 90% focused on membership development, with no mention of the Foundation. This reveals a clear sense of focus and direction
- 4.The Assembly's format was amazing, with a strong emphasis on breakout sessions where we had the opportunity to meet leaders from around the world. These sessions were fully facilitation-based, with only about 20 participants per group, ensuring everyone could speak and share their opinions. Language barriers—especially for Japanese participants—were noticeable, but translations were available via headsets in mixed-language groups. I exchanged nearly 100 business cards and built friendships with Rotarians from across the globe.



5.The "Cohort Experiment" was also new to us. Each of us was placed in a small group of five DGEs. My group consisted of two Taiwanese members, one from the USA, and one from the Netherlands, in addition to myself. We were encouraged to meet at least once per day and initiate discussions. We felt that this could serve as a template for PELS and other district events.

6. There were no lengthy presentations and no lengthy introductions. No one spoke for more than 10 minutes, and no introduction took more than one minute. The planning and choreography were brilliant and impressive. Each speaker spoke from a pre-prepared text displayed on a set of prompters visible through three ceiling-mounted screens, ensuring that no one got the impression they were reading from a script. All nine plenary and eight breakout sessions started and ended precisely on time.

7. The cultural evening and food festival night were amazing events to learn about different cultures from various parts of the world and experience diverse cuisines under one roof.

8.No fanfare in introducing the past RI Presidents—it was a very elegant event that lasted just five minutes. No frills, no mementos, no decorations.

9.The Rotary Action Plan and three-year goal setting lacked structure. It was suggested that each district appoint Rotary Action Plan Champions or District Chairs, who would play a vital role in creating awareness and promoting the advancement of these plans at the district level.

10. The three-year goal setting was promoted as the way forward to ensure continuity of vision, ideas, and projects. The core committee for the three-year goal setting would consist of the DG, DGE, DGN, DRFC, Membership Chair, Public Image Chair, and ad hoc members as deemed appropriate. We believe this is vital to the stability and continuity of the Rotary Action Plan.



These are my top 10 takeaways from the RI Assembly. Obviously, there are more, but I thought these would inspire us to take action, grow, and serve.

Prior to the RI Assembly, I visited a few clubs in New Jersey, New York, and Virginia and had the opportunity to give presentations about Nepal and the Rotary movement here. Furthermore, I had the chance to interact with students at the University of Virginia (UVA) and meet with a dean and trustees of the university. This has opened an opportunity to establish a relationship with the university, gain their support for research-based work, and anticipate visits from their students and faculty to Nepal.

In a nutshell, the RI Assembly and my extended visit to various Rotary clubs and other stakeholders in the USA have opened more opportunities to exchange ideas internationally and gain further support for Nepal through Rotary connections.

Let's unite for good, unite for our own growth, and unite to serve our communities.

Support to Shree Manakamana Bahira Residential Secondary School, Gorkha

RC Kathmandu West | February 28, 2025

Since 2009, the Rotary Club of Kathmandu West has been supporting the school by fulfilling various needs, including providing computers, furniture, toilets, and more. In the same year, the club initiated the Cowshed Project to empower village mothers group. Under this project, a mothers' group was formed, where each member is responsible for raising a calf. Currently, the group has 51 members, and every member has received a calf, enabling them to double their income. Additionally, the club donated Rs. 15,000 to the mothers' group to help cover rental expenses.

On February 28, 2025, the club also launched a grant of Rs. 200,000 for the school, contributing Rs. 150,000 towards it. Of this amount, the Rotary Club of Kathmandu



West contributed Rs. 125,000, while Arun Joshi contributed Rs. 25,000, along with donations of biscuits, chocolates, and juice. Arun Joshi further organized a lunch program for the community. Additionally, the club provided scholarships to five students from the same school.

Water Sanitation and Hygiene Assistance

To commemorate Rotary Month's focus on Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH), the Rotary E-Club of Namobuddha, in collaboration with the Interact Club of Kathmandu University High School (KUHS) Dhulikhel, distributed community water filters, stationery, sports equipment, and hygiene supplies to Janajagriti Basic School in Namobuddha-2.

The school building was entirely destroyed by devastating landslides on Asoj 11 and 12, forcing classes to be held in Temporary Learning Centers (TLCs). Though a small effort, this initiative sought to restore hope and encouragement among the students.

Shital Dahal, Principal of Janajagriti Basic

School, expressed that the materials provided by the Rotary Club were of tremendous value.

The program was attended by distinguished guests, including the Ward Chairperson of Namobuddha-2, the Chairperson of the School Management Committee, the Principal of KUHS, Rotary District 3292 WASH Co-Chair Situ Sainju, local social activists, and guardians. The supplies were formally handed over to the students and school administration.

Charter President Ganga Luitel and the WASH Committee Co-Chair pledged ongoing support for the school in the coming days. The total budget for the initiative was NPR 155,000.



RCHG Supports KIOCH's Vision for a 200-Bed Children's **Hospital in Nepal**

RC Himalayan Golfers | February 27, 2025

Dr. Bhagwan Koirala hosted the Rotary Club of Himalayan Golfers (RCHG) at the Kathmandu Institute of Child Health (KIOCH) site in Budhanilkantha, Kathmandu, for their 127th Weekly Meeting. The event included a site visit and a detailed presentation on KIOCH's progress and vision. District Governor (DG) Rtn. Rajendra Man Sherchan and Assistant Governor (AG) Rtn. Dinesh Shrestha were also present, underscoring the initiative's significance.

A renowned cardiothoracic surgeon, Dr. Koirala envisions a network of multi-specialty children's hospitals across all seven provinces to ensure no child is denied medical care due to financial constraints. Under KIOCH, this initiative aims to provide world-class pediatric services at government-subsidized rates, making healthcare affordable and accessible for every child in Nepal. His mission is to build a sustainable healthcare system where no child is deprived of essential medical treatment.

As a nonprofit organization, KIOCH requires substantial funding to realize its ambitious goals. The project is currently supported by contributions from the Nepalese government, Corporate sponsors, private sector, and Individual donors.

Given Rotary's extensive global and local network, its partnership could play a pivotal role in mobilizing resources for KIOCH's mission. The project aligns perfectly with Rotary's principle of "Service Above Self," highlighting the power of collaborative humanitarian efforts.

Despite Nepal having several specialized hospitals, pediatric care remains critically underserved, with fewer than 3,000 beds for nearly 10 million children. To bridge this gap,

KIOCH is constructing a 200-bed children's hospital in Kathmandu. While the Clinical & Research Building is already operational (providing OPD, lab, and administrative services), the main hospital buildings are nearing completion.

KIOCH has already demonstrated impact through its first satellite hospital in Damak, which has treated over 127,000 children, including emergency and ICU cases. The hospital also collaborates with the Koshi Province Government to offer free treatment for children under 10

During the meeting, an equipment brochure was shared, and discussions centered on securing Rotary global grants and forging strategic partnerships to further the cause.

Menstrual Hygiene Awareness Program

Menstrual Health and Hygiene (MHH) is essential to the well-being and empowerment of women and adolescent girls. On any given day, more than 300 million women worldwide are menstruating. In total, an estimated 500 million lack access to menstrual products and adequate facilities for menstrual hygiene management (MHM).

To manage menstruation effectively, girls and women require access to water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) facilities, affordable and appropriate menstrual hygiene materials, information on good practices, and a supportive environment where they can manage menstruation without embarrassment or stigma.



While menstruation is a normal and healthy part of life for most women and girls, in many societies, menstruators continue to face challenges due to cultural taboos and discriminatory social norms. The lack of information about menstruation leads to unhygienic and unhealthy practices, fostering misconceptions and negative attitudes that contribute to shaming, bullying, and even gender-based violence. For generations of girls and women, poor menstrual health and hygiene have exacerbated social and

economic inequalities, negatively impacting their education, health, safety, and overall development.

To address this issue, we conducted an awareness program at Sarbajanik Madhyamik School, Biratnagar, for students in grades 7 to 10. A slideshow was used to explain best practices, the Do's and Don'ts during menstruation, and other essential information to support them during their cycle. Additionally, we provided the school with sanitary pads worth NPR 5,000.

Free Cervical Cancer Screening Test

A total of 126 women were screened. Among them, 5 tested positive and received thermocoagulation treatment, 30 had general infections, 3 were diagnosed with polyps, 3 had prolapse, and the remaining 85 were found normal.
