Leader Speaks

DG Rajendra Man Sherchan, the District Governor for 2024–2025, has a long and distinguished history with Rotary. He served as the Charter President of RC Thamel (2001–2004) and held various leadership roles in RI District 3290, playing a key role in establishing Nepal District 3292. From 2012 to June 2021, he coordinated Adult Literacy under the Rotary Nepal Literacy Mission. His Rotary service includes positions such as Assistant Governor, District Advisory Council Member, and Co-Chair of the Family Values Subcommittee.

Rajendra has also been a leader in environmental conservation, chairing the Tree Plantation Committee, which planted over 100,000 trees in Nagarkot in 1979. Beyond Rotary, he served as Chairman of Thames International College and held director positions at Salt Trading Corporation Ltd. and Sagarmatha Insurance Company Ltd.

In recognition of his contributions, Rajendra received the Citation for Meritorious Service from the International Federation of Asian and Western Pacific Contractors' Association (IFAWPCA) in 2016. His expertise spans business, finance, industry, and education, and he has represented Nepal in numerous international forums and delegations.

Below is an excerpt from an interview conducted by GML & Publications Committee Chair Rtn. Gautam Shrestha.



Welcome to this final episode of GML for the Rotary Year 2024-25! Congratulations on your successful tenure as District Governor 2024-25 in Rotary International District 3292 (Nepal-Bhutan). Next month, in July 2025, you will hand over the responsibility of District Governor to the incoming leader, Binod Koirala. As you reflect on Rotary Year 2024-25, what stands out most to you?

This Rotary year was truly about discovering and unleashing the Magic of Rotary. As District Governor, I introduced our theme, "Magical Rotary," and I'm proud to say we embraced it wholeheartedly. What stands out most is how our Rotarians came together to create extraordinary change. Whether through tree-planting campaigns, cervical cancer screenings, polio eradication efforts, or disaster relief-every initiative reflected the magic that unfolds when we serve with purpose and compassion. We didn't just complete projects; we ignited hope, transformed communities, and embodied the true spirit of Rotary.

Did the district meet its annual fundraising targets? What worked, and what didn't?

With a goal of raising \$525,000—including \$150,000 for the Annual Fund and \$25,000 for PolioPlus—we made significant strides:

Annual Fund: \$ 122,952 PolioPlus: \$ 34,756 Endowment Fund: \$ 91,001 Other Fund \$ 155,747

Total TRF contributions: \$404,456

The magic here was in unity.
Fundraisers became more
than collections—they became
celebrations of purpose. We faced
challenges with report collection and
participation consistency, but we
countered them with transparency,
storytelling, and by reinforcing how
each dollar contributed to the magic
Rotary brings globally. We anticipate
even greater contributions by year-

end.

Global Grants—did we reach the goal?

We targeted 35 Global Grants, 22 grants have been approved and 2 are in the authorization stage. We're proud of the strong progress. The district's capacity-building efforts, especially our "Magical Rotary Labs" (interactive training and grant-writing sessions), equipped clubs to dream big and submit impactful proposals. Joint ventures with Rotaractors gave our service efforts fresh energy and inclusivity.

Was the cervical cancer screening goal met?

Over 3,500 women were screened across multiple provinces, thanks to the strong support of healthcare institutions and NGOs. While we didn't quite reach our target of 5,000, we built a solid foundation for future efforts. The real magic, however, lay in raising awareness—many of the women screened had never accessed preventive care before. That's the Magic of Rotary in action: reaching those who need it most and planting seeds of long-term change. We are now working to establish a dedicated fund to sustain this initiative.

Did we construct 50 toilets?

While we constructed only 10 toilets in schools, rural villages, and public spaces – with special attention to girls' facilities. The real magic wasn't just in the bricks and cement — it was in restoring dignity, protecting health, and ensuring that girls could continue their education without interruption during menstruation. These toilets became symbols of inclusion and opportunity. Local leaders and youth played key roles in ensuring long-term care and community ownership. That's Magical Rotary — building futures, not just facilities. We would have built more but many of the applications did not fulfill the necessary criteria.

Were 100,000 trees planted?

Over 30,000 trees now stand tall as living symbols of Rotary's commitment to the environment. Under the banner "Magical Rotary for a Greener Earth," clubs







across the district joined hands with forest user groups, eco-clubs, and schools to lead local tree-planting drives. From the hills of Gorkha to the plains of the Terai, this green magic took root — wide, deep, and strong — leaving behind a legacy of life, hope, and sustainability. The figures are based on clubs that have sent their reports.

How do we boost participation in district events?

By turning every event into a celebration of The Magic of Rotary. When members feel the emotional impact of their presence — through powerful stories, visuals, and shared moments — they are inspired to show up. Creative themes, inclusive planning, hybrid formats, and strong branding helped transform even the most formal gatherings into memorable, meaningful experiences.

How can we ensure clubs are strategic and aligned?

Magic thrives on clarity and purpose. From the start, we emphasized strategic planning at the club level, linking bylaws, budgets, and audits directly to Rotary Citation eligibility. By presenting these elements as tools for success — not obligations — clubs were more willing to embrace them. We gamified citation goals and amplified success stories, creating healthy momentum and peer inspiration across the district.

How did the District Committee perform?

The District Committee truly embodied Magical Rotary in action. Their passion, persistence, and teamwork drove real progress in membership, service, foundation giving, and public image. When challenges arose, we realigned roles, offered fresh support, and moved forward together. Leadership retreats and consistent communication kept the team energized, focused, and united.

What was the biggest achievement of the year?

Our greatest achievement was embedding The Magic of Rotary into the hearts and actions of our members. From planting trees and saving lives to mentoring youth and fundraising for polio eradication, we moved as one — united by purpose and passion. That spirit of collective transformation truly defined this Rotary year.

With great pride, our District has launched, for the first time, the Rotary WISE Fund (Women in STEM Education). Globally, women remain underrepresented in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics). In Nepal, this gap is even more pronounced. Yet we know—from data and experience—that when women excel in these fields, they don't just succeed: They lead. They innovate. They uplift entire communities. This is not merely about fairness—it's about building a smarter, more inclusive Nepal. The WISE Fund is our focused, strategic response to a challenge we can no longer ignore.

We partnered with Kathmandu University for its credibility, academic integrity, and proven track record. Kathmandu University will establish selection criteria and ensure a transparent, merit-based process, while Rotary guarantees full accountability to our partners. Annually, we will publish a detailed impact report on the Rotary District 3292 website, tracking outcomes and sharing scholars' stories. Transparency is central to our values and vital to this partnership.

The Rotary WISE Fund is a sustainable endowment. Over four years, we will raise Rs. 10 million. Annually, 50% of the interest will fund scholarships, while the remaining 50% will be reinvested—ensuring the fund grows and supports more scholars each year. This is not just a gift; it's a legacy.

This effort aligns fully with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals—specifically Goal 4 (Quality Education) and Goal 5 (Gender Equality)—and embodies Rotary's motto: Service Above Self.

To our CSR partners and title sponsor: Thank you. Your support is more than financial—it's visionary. It reflects your commitment to an inclusive future and your trust in Rotary to help achieve it.



How did your family, especially the 1st Lady, your wife, Sarojani Sherchan, support you?

As I reflect on this incredible journey, I can say with absolute certainty that nothing I achieved as District Governor would have been possible without the unwavering love and strength of my family. At the heart of that support was my beloved wife, Sarojani Sherchan. She wasn't merely beside me—she was with me. Every step, every decision, every club visit—she was there. Her belief in Rotary's values mirrored my own, and her calm strength and nurturing leadership brought balance to the often-hectic pace of Rotary life.

She fully embraced the spirit of Magical Rotary, engaging in meaningful community projectsespecially those empowering women and supporting underprivileged mothers and children. Her presence during club visits added warmth and grace, and I watched as her quiet compassion touched lives and inspired confidence among fellow Rotarians and spouses alike. She encouraged women leaders and offered grounding reassurance whenever responsibilities felt overwhelming. To call her a pillar of strength would be an understatement-she was the soul of our shared Rotary journey.

To Sarojani, and to my entire family, I offer my deepest gratitude.
Their sacrifices, patience, and encouragement made this year not just successful, but transformative.
The Magic of Rotary began at home—and from there, it illuminated our entire district.

My little granddaughter, Ariya, watched me rushing in and out of the house—day after day—for installations, programs, meetings, and DG visits that stretched across months. One day, as I prepared to leave for yet another event in





Pokhara, she looked up at me with wide, questioning eyes and said, "You don't love me... you never have time for me."

Her words shattered my heart.

I knelt down, held her close, and whispered, "Nothing could be further from the truth." I told her how deeply I loved her and how much it pained me to miss our moments together. Right then, I made her a promise: Once my term ended, I would devote time just for her—to take her out, laugh freely, and reclaim every lost second.

This District Governor journey was not just my commitment—it was my family's silent sacrifice. My grandchildren, especially, gifted me their time so I could serve others. For that selfless love, my gratitude is eternal.

Step Up, Lead On: District Training Series 24-25



Before assuming leadership roles, Rotary leaders undergo a series of structured training programs, including: Train the Trainers, District Team Learning Seminar (DTLS), Assistant Governor Learning Seminar (AGLS), President-Elect Training Seminar (PETS), District Training Assembly (DTA), and Grant Management Seminar (GMS). Each program equips participants with essential skills, fostering effective leadership and governance.

Train the Trainers (December 29-30, 2023)

Held at The Kwality Resort, Kulkot, Sindhuli, this session engaged 70 participants under the guidance of seasoned facilitators, including: DLF Chair 2024–2025 IPDG Jitendra Bahadur Rajbhandari, ARC DRF PDG Sanjaya Giri, PDG Dilendra Raj Shrestha, PDG Santosh Rijal, Co-Chairs Laxman Gyawali, Bishnu Hari Dahal, and Rtn Jayendra Rimal

DG Rajendra Prasad Dhoju and DGE Rajendra Man Sherchan inaugurated the event. The first day featured five expert presentations, followed by a fellowship cocktail dinner. Dignified Menstruation Talk and Reusable Pad-Making Training

St. Xavier's English Academy, Budhanilkantha | August 10, 2024 Total Participants 77 students

The Girl Child Empowerment Committee of RID3292, in collaboration with the RC Bhaktapur, RC Kathmandu Circle, RC New Road City Kathmandu, Saurya Society for Change, and Indaram Health, successfully organized a Dignified Menstruation Talk and Reusable Pad-Making Training. The event took place at St. Xavier's English Academy, Budhanilkantha, with the participation of

77 students from the academy and nearby institutions.

The training session, aimed at educating young girls about menstrual health and hygiene, featured hands-on instruction in creating reusable pads. This initiative aligns with Rotary's commitment to empowering women and girls, fostering both health and economic benefits.

National Peace Dialogue 2024

The National Peace Dialogue, "State Capacity and Commitment in Peace Promotion," was held on September 21, 2024, at Uniglobe School, Kamaladi, marking International Peace Day. Organized by Rotary District 3292's Peace and Conflict Resolution Subcommittee, in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Jawalakhel and Public Policy Hub, the event featured keynote speakers including Dr. Lekhnath Sharma, Hon. Santosh Pariyar, Dr. Bimala Rai Paudel, and Dr. Rajesh Aahiraj. PhD scholar Yadab Humagain presented a thematic paper on policy capacity, based on his research on Nepal, Bhutan, India, China, Rwanda, and Uganda. District Governor Rajendra Man Serchan emphasized Rotary's role in peacebuilding and education. Over 115 distinguished guests attended.

Heritage Painting Competition

A Heritage Painting Competition was successfully held at Padmakanya Vidyashram, Dillibazar, through a joint effort by Women in Leadership in Rotary and the Padmakanya Vidyashram Alumni Association. Basic Education and Literacy Seminar

Hotel Shanker Lazimpat, Kathmandu | September 8, 2024

Literacy is vital for individuals, communities, and societies. In line with this, Rotary District 3292 Nepal-Bhutan's Basic Education & Literacy (BE&L) Committee commemorates International Literacy Day by organizing introductory and orientation seminars. These events provide Rotary Clubs with a platform to explore new ideas, discuss opportunities, and initiate projects aimed at improving education and creating a supportive learning environment.

Since 2018, the BE&L Committee has assisted clubs in implementing impactful literacy initiatives, including establishing libraries, providing scholarships, enhancing teacher training, and promoting adult literacy. The goal is to foster sustainable educational growth and inspire clubs to lead efforts in advancing literacy both locally and globally. Dr. Dhruba Raj Regmi, Chief of Education at UNESCO Nepal, highlighted UNESCO and Rotary's collaborative approach to literacy, while Dr. Neven Knezevic, Chief of Education at UNICEF Nepal, presented a paper on UNICEF's contributions to education in Nepal and the region, as well as potential partnerships with Rotary. Nilkantha Dhakal, Director of CEHRD/GoN, discussed the current state of education and literacy in Nepal. Rtn Rajesh Thapa, Member Secretary of the BE&L Committee, facilitated a session on the committee's ongoing projects, activities, and collaborations within Rotary.

BE&L Chair, PDG Sanjay Giri, emphasized the district's priorities regarding the TEACH program and encouraged Rotary Clubs to submit their proposals to the district office.

TRF Symposium & Recognition Program

Hyatt Place, Kathmandu | September 22, 2024

The Rotary Foundation Symposium and Recognition Program for Rotary International Zone 6 for 2024-25 took place on September 22, 2024, at Hotel Hyatt Place in Kathmandu, with over 350 Rotarians in attendance. Awareness on Cerebral Palsy & Down Syndrome Program




District Membership Seminar

From the many club activities featured, this final edition highlights a few notable club activities from previous editions and few new ones.



Mustang Plastic Cleanup and Awareness Campaign

On May 28, 2025, the Mustang Plastic Cleanup and Awareness Campaign, organized by Rotary International District 3292, concluded successfully. This fourday environmental initiative (May 24–27) covered key locations from Pokhara to Baglung, including Kalika Temple, Saligram Museum, Ghasa, Jomsom, Kagbeni, and the Muktinath Temple surroundings.

Led by District Governor Rotarian Rajendra Man Shrechan, the campaign was supported by 12 Rotarians, local women's groups, community members, the Nepal Police, the Mustang Chief District Office, and representatives from Ranipauwa Dharmashala. Over 200 local participants took part in coordinated clean-up drives and awareness programs.

The collected waste was responsibly handed over to Himalayan Life Plastics Pvt. Ltd., the official recycling partner, for proper processing. The campaign was implemented in collaboration with Avni Center for Sustainability.

Aligned with World Environment Day 2025's theme, "Ending Plastic Pollution," the initiative aimed to raise awareness about plastic waste and its environmental impact. As part of the efforts, dustbins were distributed in Muktinath, Kagbeni School, Jomsom, and Baglung to promote sustainable waste management.

District Governor Shrechan emphasized that this campaign marks the first of many future environmental initiatives, with a commitment to making it an annual activity.

Blindness Prevention Project Equipment Transferred (GG2456041)

On May 25, 2025, a handover ceremony was held to transfer essential medical equipment to Ek Ek Paila Foundation under the "Rotary Grant" as part of the Blindness Prevention Project (Global Grant No. GG2456041). These state-of-the-art retinal screening devices enable early detection and prevention of blindness when used regularly. At Ek Ek Paila Community Center (Thapathali, Kathmandu), underprivileged patients can avail these screenings for just Rs. 150.

The Chief Guest at the Handover Ceremony was Rtn. Rajendra Man Sherchan, District Governor (DG) of Rotary International District 3292.

The Ek Ek Paila Community Health Center, operated by the Ek Ek Paila Foundation, provides highly subsidized healthcare services with a general checkup fee of just Rs. 150 and a consultant fee of Rs. 300. This vital community resource is made possible through the voluntary service of a dedicated 50-member medical team and the generous support of approximately 100 contributors who each donate Rs. 500,000 annually to sustain the center's operations.

Happy School Project Handover (GG# 2456385)

The Rotary Club of Biratnagar Fusion

officially handed over the newly renovated Shree Janta Bal Kalyan Adharbhut Vidhyalaya in Biratnagar-12 under the Happy School Project (Global Grant GG2456385) during a special ceremony held at the school premises.

The event was graced by District Governor Rtn. Rajendra Man Sherchan as the Chief Guest, along with ARC Past District Governor Rtn. Santosh Prasad Rijal, Assistant Governor Rtn. Biju Thapalia, School Principal Emma Ojha, Club President Rtn. Vivek Agrawal, Program Coordinator and Past President Rtn. Bikash Rathi, as well as teachers and Rotary Club



members.

Once in a dilapidated condition, the school has undergone a complete transformation, including the construction of new toilet blocks, complete flooring repairs, plastering and painting of all buildings, repair and installation of tin roofing, a safe drinking water station, a new office and staff room with furniture, a Montessori classroom, new benches and tables, and swings and slides for children's recreation.

This remarkable renovation was made possible through the generous support of The Rotary Foundation, Rotary Districts, and international partner Rotary Club of Delhi (D3011), along with the dedicated efforts of Rotary Club of Biratnagar Fusion members.

The Happy School Project reflects Rotary's enduring commitment to enhancing educational infrastructure and fostering a brighter future for students and the community.

Inauguration of CT Scan Machine at Scheer Memorial Hospital, Banepa

Jr., CEO of the hospital, jointly inaugurated the CT Scan Machine in a ribbon-cutting ceremony on 7 May 2025.

District Governor Rajendra Man
Sherchan emphasized Rotary's ongoing
contributions to health, education, and
other development projects in Nepal.
"Rotary International District 3292 is proud
to be associated with the installation and
handover of this CT scan machine, which

will benefit approximately 1.5 million people in the region," he said.

The hospital has introduced a state-of-the-art 160-slice CT scan machine as part of a global grant project worth \$459,065 (approximately NPR 6.1 crore). The project also included the procurement of a generator and transformer to ensure uninterrupted power supply for the machine.

With this advanced diagnostic tool, the hospital will now provide higher-quality healthcare services to 1.5 million people in Kavre and neighboring districts, including Sindhupalchowk, Dolakha, Ramechhap, Okhaldhunga, and Sindhuli.

The Rotary Club of Bonita Beach Sunset, Florida, USA, led the fundraising efforts. Major donors included The Rotary Foundation, Advent Health Rocky Mountain Region, Adventist Health International, Loma Linda University (USA), and the Washington Nepal Health Foundation. The project was also generously supported by multiple Rotary Districts and Clubs across the USA. The Rotary Clubs of Kopundol and Kavre Banepa were the local partners for this global grant.

Wastewater Treatment Project to United Mission Hospital (GG#2124878)

The Rotary Club of Palpa Tansen officially handed over the Wastewater Treatment Project to the United Mission Hospital (UMH) under the Rotary Global Grant.

This vital initiative ensures a sustainable supply of clean water and efficient wastewater management for UMH, a leading healthcare provider in Tansen serving Palpa district and neighboring regions.

The project addresses critical needs by preventing environmental contamination

through upgraded wastewater treatment systems that safely process medical and general waste while complying with health and environmental regulations. It also guarantees a reliable supply of potable water for medical procedures, patient care, and daily hospital operations—essential in a region facing water scarcity. Additionally, the initiative enhances healthcare services by improving sanitation, reducing waterborne disease risks, and promoting



environmental sustainability.

With a total investment of Rupees 4.22 crore (four crore twenty-two lakh), this project highlights Rotary's commitment to public health, environmental protection, and community development. The advanced water and wastewater solutions implemented will deliver long-term benefits for both the hospital and the wider Tansen community.





Computer Lab Handover

In a continued effort to bridge the digital divide, the Rotary Club of Pokhara Fishtail, in collaboration with EduTech Nepal, the Rotary Club of Pokhara Lakeside, and UK philanthropist Elspeth Sanderson, handed over a modern computer lab to Shree Bindhyabasini Secondary School in Barpatan, Pokhara-2.

The lab, equipped with 21 computers and advanced educational software, was inaugurated by District Governor-Elect Binod Koirala, who unveiled the commemorative plaque during the ceremony. This facility will serve 850 students and teachers, providing them with essential digital tools for enhanced learning.

This installation marks a significant milestone—the 30th computer lab established nationwide under the direct leadership of the **Rotary Club of Pokhara Fishtail**. The event was chaired by Club President Maheshwar Pahari, with Rotary Club of Pokhara Lakeside President Upendra Adhikari as co-chair, and attended by 18 Rotarians.

Earlier, on 21 April 2025, the club, in partnership with EduTech Nepal, Rotary Club of Neoteric Hong Kong, and Rotary Club of Pokhara Midtown, also handed over a computer lab to Shree Ramjyoti Secondary School. These initiatives underscore Rotary's unwavering commitment to empowering communities through technology, fostering education, and creating opportunities for students in need.

Through these efforts, the **Rotary Club** of **Pokhara Fishtail** continues to drive innovation and digital inclusion, ensuring that young learners have access to the tools they need for a brighter future.

On September 11, 2024, the Rotary Club of Pokhara Fishtail, in association with the Rotary Club of Pokhara Paradise, handed over a modern computer laboratory to Shree Amarjyoti Secondary School in Arjunchaupari, Syangja, to promote and provide access to ICT education.

The sophisticated computer lab consists of 20 modern computers, arranged with standardized furniture, including desks and chairs. The total cost of the lab is approximately Rs. 10 lakh. The lab was established through joint contributions from Edu-Tech Nepal, Sunscreen IT Foundation, the Rotary Club of Pokhara Paradise, and the Rotary Club of Pokhara Fishtail.



Free Health Camp in Ghusel

The Rotary Club of Jawalakhel
Manjushree, in partnership with Netradham
Eye Care Center and Alka Hospital Pvt. Ltd.,
and with support from local organizations,
organized a two-day free health camp in
the scenic village of Ghusel on June 6-7,
2025. The camp provided no-cost medical
services to over 315 patients from Ghusel
and surrounding communities.

Services included gynecological checkups, emphasizing cervical cancer screening and uterine prolapse management, as well as fully booked diabetes and hypertension screenings. The dental team performed over 100 tooth extractions and cavity fillings, while eye specialists identified multiple cataract cases and conducted 11 successful cataract surgeries. Patients also received free reading glasses after vision tests, along with essential medicines, soaps, oral rehydration salts (ORS), Horlicks, and hygiene supplies. The camp's success relied on the efforts of medical professionals, 15 Rotary volunteers coordinating logistics, and contributions from Dabur Nepal (providing toothbrushes, toothpaste, and juices). Local women volunteers promoted awareness, while community health workers and a restaurant owner supported the team with meals.

Rotary Empowers Through Wheelchairs



On April 2, 2025, the **Rotary Club of Tripureswor** distributed 10 wheelchairs to individuals undergoing treatment for physical disabilities at Spark Health Homes in Kalimati. The recipients, who had traveled from various districts across the country, expressed gratitude for the initiative, which had a profound positive impact on their lives.

Earlier, the Rotary Club of Tripureswor had provided 20 wheelchairs to underprivileged individuals in remote areas. With this latest

effort, the club has now distributed over 30 wheelchairs in the 2024/2025 Rotary year. Additionally, the club remains committed to supporting those in need by providing other essential mobility aids, such as crutches, walkers, and commode chairs, whenever required.

The humanitarian program was graced by the presence of Rotary District First Lady Sarojani Sherchan, PDG Rajiv Pokhrel, past presidents, members of the Rotary Club of Tripureswor, and several other Rotarians.

On October 27, the **Rotary Club of Surunga**, in partnership with Kanakai
Municipality Ward No. 4, organized a
potato farming technology training to
support local farmers. Deputy Mayor Asha
Sharma Shivakoti inaugurated the event,
highlighting agriculture's vital role in Nepal's
economy—where over 70% of locals depend
on farming. Over 60 farmers gained expert
insights from Prasodhan Niroula on seed
selection, soil management, and planting
techniques.

The next day (October 28), the club extended the program to Jhapa Gau Palika, focusing on sustainable potato cultivation. Led again by Niroula, the hands-on training engaged 50+ farmers and concluded with gratitude to all contributors.

This initiative was spearheaded by the Rotary Club of Dillibazar-Kathmandu, with partial support from the Rotary Club of Kathmandu Metro, Echoes Tomorrow (Australia), the Ramailo President 2021-2022 Group, DG Rtn. Rajendra Man Sherchan, and in partnership with Matrika Eye Hospital, Kalpana Foundation, Shiwakoti Bag Udhyog, and Srijana Memorial Trust Nepal.

Support for the Construction of a School Building

Sri Saraswoti Basic School, established in 2014, is located in Bandipur Rural Municipality, Tanahun District, Gandaki Province.

On May 2, 2025, members of the **Rotary Club of Patan West** visited the school, which had 30 students and six teachers, including an Early Childhood Development (ECD) facilitator. Among its three buildings, one is in a severely dilapidated condition and unusable for classes. The other two buildings have four rooms in total (two rooms each), with one room partitioned to accommodate more classes due to space

constraints.

The Rotary Club of Patan West pledged to construct a two-room school building. The construction was completed within a month, and the new facility was handed over to the school on June 7, 2025, in a ceremony attended by Rotarians, the Chairperson of Bandipur Rural Municipality, school staff, students, and local community members.

The total project cost was NPR 1,300,000, with the Rotary Club of Patan West contributing NPR 350,000 and the remaining amount covered by the Municipality.



Water Filter System Installation

The **Rotary Club of Patan East** installed and handed over a water filtration system at Shree Janak Secondary School in Namobuddha Municipality-4, Kavrepalanchok. The project will provide clean drinking water to 1,154 students, helping prevent waterborne diseases.



Hospital and Rehabilitation Center for Disabled Children (HRDC)

The Rotary Foundation, through RI District 3012, RI District 3261, and RI District 3292, is embarking on a transformative journey with a physical disability management project in Nepal. This heartfelt initiative is brought to life by the Rotary Club of Pashupati, Kathmandu, in an inspiring international partnership with the Rotary Club of Kashipur, RID 3110, India.

With the dedicated support of the Hospital and Rehabilitation Centre for Disabled Children (HRDC), this project, launched on May 15, 2024, and running until April 2025, is poised to make a profound impact. It aims

to change the lives of 650 children with physical disabilities and their families within a year.

The focus of this endeavor is deeply compassionate: providing life-changing surgical interventions and assistive devices, including prostheses and orthoses, to the most vulnerable and needy children in Nepal.

Valued at USD 375,000, this project is a testament to the power of collective goodwill and unwavering commitment to creating a brighter, more inclusive future.



Free Orthopaedic Surgical Camp and OPD Service Camp in Easter Nepal



The Rotary Club of Lalitpur successfully conducted Free Orthopaedic Surgical Camps and Outpatient Service Camps in various locations across Nepal. These initiatives were carried out in technical collaboration with Nepal Orthopaedic Hospital and made possible through the generous financial support of Dr. Dietmar Moure, along with friends and family from

Switzerland. The program aimed to support community health, raise awareness through health-related activities, provide medical services to underserved populations, and facilitate skill transfer between visiting medical professionals and local healthcare providers.

Key Program Highlights:

1. Six-Day Surgical and OPD Camp in

Panchthar: Held from 18–23 March 2025 at the request of Phidim Municipality in Panchthar (Province 1), the medical camp served approximately 1,400 patients from the surrounding areas, including remote villages of Tehrathum. A total of 103 surgeries were performed, with around 30 classified as major complex cases. All medical services were provided free of charge, including pathological tests, radiological X-rays, necessary steel implants, and all required medications.

2. Additional Outreach Activities: Over 25,000 CFH was collected to support the project. A two-day Free Orthopaedic Outpatient Service Camp was conducted at Gherabari Community Health Post and the Nepal Disability Centre in Bhadrapur, in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Bhadrapur. Nearly 300 patients received free checkups, and all prescribed medications were distributed at no cost. This comprehensive health initiative demonstrates Rotary Club of Lalitpur's commitment to improving access to quality orthopedic care in underserved communities while strengthening local healthcare capacity through professional knowledge exchange.

Padel for Child Education: CycloFun 3.0 & CycloCross 2.0 presented an intense 18-kilometer The Rs. 5,55,000 project incl

In an inspiring blend of sport, service, and social impact, the **Rotary Club of Dharan** organized its signature "Padel for Child Education" event under the banners of CycloFun 3.0 and CycloCross 2.0 on April 12, 2025. The day began at Dharan's bustling Bhanuchowk and concluded with a vibrant celebration at Saraswati Higher Secondary School in Panbari, where hundreds gathered to support child education.

The opening ceremony was graced by District Governor Rtn. Rajendra Man Sherchan.

The event featured two distinct cycling programs. CycloFun 3.0 offered a 10-kilometer recreational ride for families and enthusiasts, while CycloCross 2.0

presented an intense 18-kilometer competitive race that attracted both national and international cyclists. The competition produced inspiring results, with Miss Indra Kala Nembang winning the Women's Fastest Rider category and Mr. Ganesh Bahadur Gurung taking top honors in the Master 40+ division. The overall CycloCross 2.0 podium featured Mr. Suraj Rana Magar (APF) in first place with an impressive 45-minute finish, followed by Mr. Achyut Krishna Kharel (APF) and Mr. Deep Sagar (Dharan).

With 174 participating cyclists and over 1,000 spectators, the event drew significant community engagement. Distinguished attendees included District Governor, District Public Image Chair Rtn. Amit Giri, Assistant Governor Rtn. Kumar Mani Pokhrel, along with various district officials and Rotary Club members.

The Rs. 5,55,000 project included establishing a Rotary Children's Gaming Park at Saraswati School (allocated Rs. 1,65,000) to support children's physical and social development.







Thirty-Six Hemodialysis **Machines Donated**

The Rotary Club of Dhulikhel has handed over hemodialysis machines to four different hospitals.

During a program held in Dhulikhel, 36 hemodialysis machines were transferred with the support of international partner German Rotary Volunteer Doctor E.V. to enhance treatment accessibility for kidney patients. The club distributed the machines as follows:

- •10 machines to Dhulikhel Hospital,
- •10 machines to Shri Memorial Hospital,
- •10 machines to Kaushalya Memorial Hospital in Kohalpur, Banke, and
- •6 machines to Shahid Smriti Hospital in Bardghat.

At the event, industrialist Binod Chaudhary, the chief guest, acknowledged international support for critical projects but lamented that bureaucratic delays

hinder effective service delivery in Nepal. Citing Dhulikhel as a success model, he stressed that proactive local leadership accelerates development.

Dhulikhel Mayor Ashok Kumar Byanjoo Shrestha highlighted the municipality's health sector achievements and its new household survey initiative. The datadriven program aims to create an ecofriendly, equitable, and poverty-free city while supporting entrepreneurship.

President Jyotsna Sainju announced that the donated hemodialysis machines have a combined value exceeding 50 million rupees. She extended gratitude to international partners, including German Rotary Volunteer Doctors-notably Vice President Dr. Claus Kiehling and President Jobst Isbery—as well as John Price from the Edwardstown Rotary Club (Australia), for their instrumental support in procuring the equipment.

Food Items and Medical **Supplies** Distribution

On February 23, 2025, the Rotary Club of Boudha distributed food items and medical supplies worth NPR 26,000 to the Spinal Injury Group Nepal, located in Gokarneshwor-8, in celebration of the 120th Rotary Day. These supplies will benefit 11 residents with spinal injuries at the center, who hail from various parts of Nepal and are currently pursuing their studies at Khagendra Navajeevan School. The center primarily relies on donations from generous individuals and seeks support from service organizations like Rotary to meet its basic needs.



Artificial Limb Distribution



The Rotary Club of Birtamode, in collaboration with Pashupati Gaushala Dharamshala Kathmandu, Marwari Sewa Samiti Nepal, and Agrasen Bhawan Birtamode, successfully organized a noble and impactful Artificial Limb Distribution Project in Birtamode.

The initiative aimed to restore mobility and dignity to individuals who had lost limbs due to accidents, illnesses, or congenital conditions. A total of 26 beneficiaries from across Nepal received free, custom-fitted artificial limbs, empowering them to walk

confidently and regain their independence. This joint effort exemplified the power of community and compassion, as organizations came together beyond boundaries to serve humanity. The event not only brought smiles to the recipients but also underscored the importance of inclusive and accessible healthcare.

The Rotary Club of Birtamode and its partners remain committed to sustaining such life-changing initiatives, ensuring they continue to uplift lives and spread hope.

Rotary Flood Relief

Nepal experienced severe floods at the end of September 2024, due to record monsoon rains, leading to over 258 deaths and widespread destruction. In response, Rotary District 3292 Nepal, Bhutan, along with local Rotary clubs, organized multiple relief initiatives to assist affected communities. Rotary clubs distributed essential relief supplies, including food, clean drinking water, blankets, and clothing, to displaced families in flood-hit regions.

Rotary Club of Baneshwor

On October 1, 2024, a team from the Rotary Club of Baneshwor arrived at Dhulikhel Hospital to hand over relief materials, including blankets, rice, lentils, and salt, to the Nepal Army. Due to impassable roads, the Army will transport the supplies by helicopter to the flood-hit area of Khanikhola, Kavre. The total value of the relief materials is approximately Nrs. 1,00,000.

Rotary Club of Biratnagar Central

On October 4, 2024, the Rotary Club of Biratnagar Central, in collaboration with the Rotaract Club of Biratnagar Central, extended support to flood victims in Dhanbardiya, Morang, Ward No. 5, where 70 families were affected. The club distributed various essential food items worth Rs 55,000 to the families in need.

Rotary Club of Bagmati Kathmandu

The Rotary Club of Bagmati Kathmandu has raised Rs. 101,000 from its members to support flood victims across various parts of the country through the District Disaster Fund. In line with the club's decision, a cheque for Rs. 101,000 was handed over to District Governor on October 22, 2024.

Rotary Club of Biratnagar Downtown

The Rotary Club of Biratnagar Downtown organized a humanitarian effort to assist flood victims in Jehda-1, Dhuni village, by providing essential rations. The support included a variety of food items: rice, flour, puffed rice, rice flakes, pulses, salt, masala, oil, instant noodles, vegetables, and ready-to-eat snacks. The total expenditure for this initiative was NPR 62,120, generously donated by the club members.

Rotary Club of Pashupati Kathmandu

The Club stepped forward to aid seven affected families in Kirtipur Municipality-4, Simkhola on September 29, 2024. The floods caused extensive damage, burying two homes and completely destroying several others, leaving families with minimal belongings. With the generous support of its members, the club raised funds and distributed relief supplies worth NPR 80,000 to help the displaced families recover.

Similarly on November 12, 2024, the club joined forces with the Red Cross Society to provide essential aid (blankets, pressure cookers, food items, clothing) to 30 individuals impacted by the disaster at Roshi Janabijaya Secondary School, Roshi Village Municipality.

Rotary Club of Dhulikhel, Kathmandu Circle, Rotaract KUMS, Disaster Aid Nepal & Aquabox

On October 5, 2024, the Rotary Club of Dhulikhel, in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Kathmandu Circle and the Rotaract Club of Dhulikhel, provided 8 Aquaboxes and food supplies to 8 families in Dhulikhel Municipality Ward No. 02, who had lost their homes due to landslides.



Rotary Club of Dhulikhel, Kathmandu Circle, Rotaract KUMS, Disaster Aid Nepal & Aquabox

On October 2, 2024, the Rotary Club of Dhulikhel in associated with Disaster Aid Nepal, Rotary Club of Kathmandu Circle, Rotaract KUMS and Aquabox Foundation, delivered 15 relief packages, including Aquaboxes and food items, through the local government of Dhulikhel Municipality Ward 12 to the victims of the landslide. Due to the remoteness of the area and the landslide-damaged roads, the support had to be sent via the local government, and it will take approximately 3 hours to reach the affected families. 15 houses have been completely destroyed, and many others have been partially damaged in this area.

Rotary Club of Gyaneshwor

On 28th and 29th September 2024, the Rotary Club of Gyaneshwor distributed food, clothes, water, stencils, and grocery items to flood victims in the slum areas of Teku and Sankhamul. Around 275 people benefited from this initiative.

Rotary Club of Kantipur

On October 5, 2024, relief materials were distributed to residents of Ward No. 13, Sankhu Fedi, who lost their homes in the recent floods. The program was attended by Rtn Kiran and Rtn Dilip.

Rotary Club of NewRoad City

On October 8, the Rotary Club of New Road City, Kathmandu, in collaboration with the Inner Wheel Club of New Road City, Kathmandu, donated 20 gas stoves, lighters, pipes, and gas cylinders to the flood victims of Lele, Lalitpur.

Rotary Club of Dhulikhel

The Rotary Club of Dhulikhel has handed over 300 solar-powered lights to Bethanchowk Rural Municipality Ward No. 02. The area had been without electricity for nine days, with no prospects of restoration for another 5-6 months. Dr. Ulrich Adolf for sponsoring the lights, people can now carry out their daily activities more easily.

Rotary Club of Narayani Midtown

On October 1, 2024, the Rotary Club of Narayani Mid Town, in collaboration with the Women's Entrepreneurs Association of Nepal (WEAN) Chitwan, distributed relief materials to the Chairman of Ward No. 16.

Rotary Club of Lahan

On October 1, 2024, the Rotary Club of Lahan organized an Immediate Food Distribution Program for flood victims in the villages of Sunderpur and Islampur, located in Lahan Ward No. 4. A total of 30 households affected by the floods received food packets containing: 10 kg of rice, 1 packet of salt, 1 kg of dal, 1 liter of oil, ½ kg of soybean, 3 kg of puffed rice (Murhi), 2 kg of flour (Atta), 2 bars of soap and 1 packet of mixed spices

Rotary Club of Yala

Rotary club of yala had donated 20,000 (twenty thousand rupees) to the flood victims of "Sat



Prayaash" Senior Citizens on 5th October 2024.

Rotary Club of Tripureshwor

The Rotary Club of Tripureshwar, known for its support during times of crisis, successfully provided assistance to 200 members of the Kamwal Ward community, delivering aid to the people of Vanshighat on 29th September, 2024.

Rotary Club of Kawasoti

Rotary Club Kawasoti distributes relief material in Vinai Triveni Village in Madhyabindu Municipality Nawalpur on September 30 & October 1, 2024. Around 450 houses in Madhyabindu Municipality have been inundated due to floods. Relief materials have been handed over to around 200 families of ward no. 2.

Rotary Club of Birgunj and Birgunj Metropolis

The Rotary Club of Birgunj and RC Birgunj Metropolis, with support from Hotel Vishwa, joined forces to send relief materials on October 7 for flood victims in Sindhuli District, specifically Nepalthok, Mulkot, and Khurkot.

Rotary Club of Kathmandu Height

On October 8, 2024, the Rotary Club of Kathmandu Heights, in collaboration with Wine to Water Nepal, the Rotary Club of Cranbrook Sunrise and several local organizations, launched a disaster relief initiative to support flood and landslide-affected regions in Namo Buddha Municipality. Essential supplies were distributed to 50 households in Ward 10 and Ward 1, the areas hardest hit by the disaster.

Rotary Club of Chitwan

The Rotary Club of Chitwan organized the Narayani River Flood Relief Campaign at the Rotary Karunalaya Old Age Home.

Rotary Club of Bharatpur

The Club provided relief materials, including 100 blankets, 100 mosquito nets, and 100 liters of phenyl, to Narayani Dobhan Tol Bikash Sanstha in Bharatpur-3, Chitwan. This aid came in response to severe flooding from the Narayani River, which affected 55 houses in the area.

Rotary Club of Balaju

The Rotary Club of Balaju collectively

donated approximately 45,000 rupees to support flood victims in Kavre District. Two 1,000-liter water tanks were provided to a school in Roshi Rural Municipality.

Rotary Club of Dhulikhel & Rotary Club of Kathmandu Circle

The Rotary Club of Dhulikhel, in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Kathmandu Circle, Rotary Club of Moruya (Australia), and Disaster Aid Nepal, provided immediate food relief and 10 Aquaboxes to 22 families whose homes were destroyed by recent landslides and floods in Chamranbeshi, Bethanchowk-01, Kavre, Nepal on October 22, 2024.

Rotary Club of Himalayan Golfers

The Rotary Club of Himalayan Golfers (RCHG), alongside the Rotaract Club of Himalayan Golfers, provided critical relief to 17 flood-affected families in Godavari. After a needs assessment, RCHG members contributed NPR 50,000 (Phase 1) and NPR 100,000 (Phase 2) to aid recovery efforts. On October 4, 2024, essential groceries—including rice, lentils, oil, and sanitary items—were distributed with the help of volunteers. A follow-up visit revealed further needs, prompting a second phase on October 8, 2024, where mattresses, blankets, and utensils were provided to 14 families. The Hope for Nepal Foundation donated blankets, water filters, and food supplies, while Ms. Shiva Sing contributed additional food items.

Rotary Club of Panauti, Kavre-Banepa, Dhulikhel-Nepal, Kavre Valley, & E-Club of Namobuddha

In a powerful demonstration of solidarity, Rotary Clubs from Kavrepalanchok – including the Rotary Clubs of Panauti, Kavre-Banepa, Dhulikhel-Nepal, Kavre Valley, and E-Club of Namobuddha – joined forces with Rotary International District 3292 Nepal-Bhutan to support disaster-affected families in Patikharka, Bethanchowk Gaunpalika-4. This coordinated response addressed urgent needs following the devastating September 2024 floods and landslides. The relief efforts included distributing 101 blankets, T-shirts, hoodies, and stationery supplies to students of Shree Kalika Secondary School, made possible through the support of German volunteer Klaus Meyer. The program also distributed 22 water filters to local households through a partnership with Wine To Water Nepal and the RID 3292 WASH Committee.

Network of Rotary Clubs of Lalitpur (NRCL)

Godawari Municipality, Ward Nos. 5 and 6, Lele, Lalitpur

In collaboration with RID3292, NRCL supported flood victims in Godawari Municipality, Ward Nos. 5 and 6, Lele, Lalitpur. The event took place in the presence of DG Rajendra Man Sherchan, First Lady Sarojani Sherchan, Mayor Gajendra Maharjan, and Ward Chairs. The following aid was provided:

- 1. Gas cylinders and cooking stoves for 11 households in Ward No. 5.
- 2. Blankets, mattresses, and torches for 45 families in Ward No. 6.
- 3. Solar lights for 20 households that had lost power due to extensive damage to their electrical systems.

Maternity Relief

With financial support from RID 3292 and the NRCL, provided maternity relief materials to women in Ward No. 6. In just two days, NRCL delivered supplies to 4 families with newborns, while in Sisneri's Ward No. 4, assisted a family with a 1-month-old baby. The items distributed included blankets, baby suits, feeding gowns, wipes, baby soap, youth chaku, Horlicks, white nappies, baby towels, and cash support of NPR 1,000 to each of the 5 households.

Indrasworabar Muncipality, Sisneri

On 8th October 2024, a team from NRCL, comprising representatives from RC Lalitpur, RC Patan East, and RC Yala, visited the flood-affected areas of Indrasworabar Municipality, specifically Sisneri wards 2 and 3. The visit took place in the presence of a member of the Bagmati Provincial Assembly, along with the Rural Municipality Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson, and Ward Chairs. Thirty households, whose homes were completely destroyed by the floods, are either staying with relatives or in temporary shelters were given emergency relief. RID3292 and NRCL extended support by providing each household with: 30 KGs of



rice, 2 KGs of lentils, 1 liter of oil, 1 packet of salt, 2 KGs of sugar, 2 meters of P-foam mattress, and 1 blanket.

Tikathali

On October 1, 2024, support was organized for 50 families in the Tikathali area of Lalitpur. This relief effort was made possible through the collaboration of the NRCL and Rajbiraj Naya Samaj from Saptari, providing essential assistance to those in need.

Godawari Muncipality

In collaboration with RID 3292, NRCL provided essential support to flood victims in Godawari Municipality, Ward No. 7, Devichour, by donating HDPE water supply pipes valued at NPR 557,429, benefiting 100 households. Additionally, blankets, bedsheets, foam mats, and pillows worth NPR 300,700 were distributed to 97 households in Gotikhel, Mahankal Rural Municipality. In Farsidole, Lalitpur, similar relief items valued at NPR 161,200 were distributed, benefiting 52 households.

Rotary Club of Bhadgaun, Kathmandu Circle, Sunkoshi & Himalayan Golfers

The Clubs extended its heartfelt support to the survivors of the devastating landslides in Lek Kharka, Ward No. 3, Doramba Sailung RMC, Ramechhap, where 10 precious lives were lost where the clubs distributed essential relief materials, including 2 blankets, 2 mattresses, and an Aqua Box, to 37 affected families in Lek Kharka.

Rotary Club of Dhulikhel, Kathmandu Circle, Kavre-Banepa, Panauti, Kavre Valley, and RE-Club Namobuddha

In a significant effort to enhance the safety and effectiveness of local firefighters, several Rotary Clubs collaborated to provide Firefighter Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to municipalities in Kavre and neighboring districts. The Firefighter PPE Support initiative was supported by Fire4Nepal, Belgium, and organized by the Rotary Club of Dhulikhel-Nepal, Rotary Club of Kathmandu Circle, Rotary Club of Kavre-Banepa, Rotary Club of Panauti, Rotary Club of Kavre Valley, and Rotary E-Club of Namobuddha. Special thanks go to Nugal Ananda Vaidya for coordination and facilitation.

The support reached the following municipalities: Dhulikhel, Panauti, Mandandeupur, Namobuddha, Kamalamai, Sindhuli & Dhudhauli



The project aimed to equip firefighters with essential protective gear, ensuring their safety while responding to emergencies such as fires, natural disasters, and other critical incidents. By providing high-quality PPE, the Rotary Clubs strive to enhance the operational readiness of fire departments in these regions.

The distributed PPE is expected to significantly improve firefighter safety, reduce risks during rescue operations, and strengthen emergency response capacities

in the supported municipalities. This initiative highlights the Rotary Clubs' commitment to serving communities and addressing critical needs in disaster-prone areas.

This collaborative effort underscores the power of partnerships in addressing community challenges. The Rotary Clubs extend their gratitude to Fire4Nepal, Belgium, and Rtn. Nugal Ananda Vaidya for their generous support in making this project possible.

Setting Up ICT Facilities in Schools (GG# 2456844)

The Rotary Club of Maharajgunj

successfully completed the Global Grant
Project 2456844, titled "Setting Up
ICT (Information and Communications
Technology) Facilities in Schools to
Improve the Quality of Education in Nepal."
This project was supported by the Rotary
Club of Gwangnam and several associated
clubs from South Korea, including the
Gwangju Club, Gwangju Hansung Club,
Opo Club, Opo Hanul Club, Gonjiam
Club, Gonjiam Expo Club, and Gwanjiam
Munbeak Club (District 3600).

On December 17, 2024, the Rotary Club of Maharajgunj officially handed over the project to the Shri Azad School Management Committee, Baluwa (Ward 12, Panchkhal Municipality, Kavrepalanchowk). The total project cost was NRs. 71,00,000.

Nine delegates from the Rotary Club



of Gwangnam (District 3600) and its associated clubs attended the event, with four of them delivering speeches and expressing their commitment to ongoing support for the school in the future.

The Global Grant Project equipped fifteen classrooms with 75-inch Interactive Smart Boards and established a fully functional e-library, which includes 20 branded Dell desktop computers, 20 computer tables and chairs, a server desktop computer with accessories, and complete furnishing of the e-library room.

Additionally, an agreement was signed between Open Learning Education Nepal (OLE Nepal) and the Rotary Club of Maharajgunj to enhance access to quality education by integrating technology into classrooms at Shri Azad School. This collaboration aims to provide open and free access to quality education while fostering innovative learning environments for students.

Free Mega Health Camp

Similarly on April 4, 2025, seven computers have been provided to Sagarmatha Basic School in Solukhumbu, Ward No 1 of Nechasalyan Municipality.

Nepal has been actively promoting technology-based education through various initiatives, including National Curriculum Framework, One Laptop Per Student Concept & Guidelines for ICT Use in School Education.

These efforts aim to integrate information and communication technology (ICT) into classrooms, ensuring students are equipped with modern skills. The Rotary Club's contribution aligns with this vision, fostering digital literacy in rural schools.





Changu Completes Diverse Programs in a Single Day

The Rotary Club of Changu organized a series of programs on February 8, 2025, in the historic and religiously significant Changu Narayan Temple premises and the Shankha Dah area, located in Ward 4 of Changunarayan Municipality, Bhaktapur.

The initiatives included cleaning the temple premises, installing signboards with the message "Let's not litter around the temple area" to promote cleanliness,

and organizing a large-scale open blood donation event. Additionally, the club established a Rotary Community Corps to engage the local community and handed over 10 iron dustbins labeled "For Waste Only" to promote proper waste disposal.

These activities aimed to preserve the cultural and religious heritage of the area while promoting community engagement and environmental awareness.

Kathak dance. Cultural ramp walks and dances represented diverse communities, including the Magar, Rai, Tharu, Newar, and Chhetri. A major highlight was the Tibetan dance "Tashi Sheolpa," symbolizing luck and introduced by the Great Fifth Dalai Lama in 1645. Over 300 attendees enjoyed musical performances by Rotaractors and external artists.

The carnival also served as a fundraiser for Project Chori, an initiative aimed at encouraging rural female students to pursue careers in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics).



Handover of Global Grant "The Visionary Project"

On March 25, 2025, the **Rotary Club of Biratnagar Downtown** successfully
completed a comprehensive infrastructure
development project at Shiv Adharbhut
Vidyalaya. The initiative included the
construction of new sanitation facilities
and repairs to existing toilets, installation
of a modern water station, restoration
of the perimeter boundary wall, and a
complete repainting of school buildings
and the outdoor play area.

The project also created dedicated spaces for Montessori education, administrative work, and mid-day meals, alongside full electrical upgrades including lighting, fans, and wiring systems. Further improvements featured the setup of two

computer stations, extensive repair works, new furniture installations, and health awareness programs supported by hygiene kit distributions.

The handover ceremony was attended by representatives from Biratnagar Metropolitan City, the Department of Education, Ward No. 1 officials, and the School Management Committee and Rotarians.

Implemented under Global Grant #2453359 with the Rotary Club of Dona Paula (District 3170) as the international partner, this 4-million-rupee (40 lakh) project will directly benefit 150 students, teachers, and staff while positively impacting the entire school community.



Supports Chepang Community

The Rotary Club of Ratnanagar conducted a targeted assistance program for the Chepang community in a remote, underserved area, addressing critical needs in education, health, and basic living conditions. The initiative focused on three key areas: educational support for children, winter relief, and women's hygiene training.

The program provided essential support to 110 school children, distributing complete stationery sets including notebooks, pens, pencils, and erasers, along with winter clothing, school uniforms, and warm blankets for protection against cold weather. For maternal health support, pregnant and postpartum women received high-quality blankets, hygienic sanitary products, and comprehensive training on proper hygiene practices.

Meditation Program Held at the Historic Pakari Tree Rotary Club President Bishnu Prasad Beyond promoting medit

The Rotary Club of Devdaha successfully hosted a Mega Meditation Program on World Meditation Day 2024 under the historic Pakari tree—Asia's largest tree—located in Devdaha-8, Pakari. This culturally and historically significant site is believed to be where Lord Buddha meditated, making it a deeply symbolic location for the event.

The program drew 189 participants and was supported by Jeevan Vigyan, Devdaha, offering expert guidance on yoga and meditation practices. With a total budget of NPR 320,486, the event covered management, materials, and snacks for attendees.

Distinguished guests attended, including

Rotary Club President Bishnu Prasad Pathak; Chief Guest Dhurba Prasad Kharel, Mayor of Devdaha Municipality; Deputy Mayor Bidhya Laxmi Gurung; ward chairpersons; and Immediate Past President Dr. Sundar Pandey. Their presence highlighted the community's commitment to mental health and wellbeing.

Beyond promoting meditation's benefits, the event showcased the Pakari tree's potential as a meditation center and tourist attraction. This initiative has sparked interest in developing Devdaha into a peace tourism hub, which could significantly boost the local economy.



ICT training in collaboration with Basic Education & Literacy Committee





The Rotary Club of Kathmandu, in association with the Basic Education & Literacy Committee of Rotary District 3292, successfully concluded the 14th batch of the ICT program on June 14, 2025, which had commenced on July 12, 2024.

The Rotary Club of Kathmandu, along with other Rotary clubs (Rotary Club of Pashupati Kathmandu, Yala, Bagmati Kathmandu, Madhyapur, Parbat, Kathmandu Kalanki, Gorkha, Rajdhani, Rampur, Ilam, Burtibang Dhorpatan, Gokarneshwor, Dharan, and Central Banke), has been tirelessly working to enhance the digital teaching and learning capabilities of public school teachers.

The ICT training for public school teachers, conducted under the Teacher Support component of the TEACH program by RNLM, has progressed smoothly. So far, the training has benefited 287 teachers from 167 schools across various districts. The sessions were conducted in collaboration with multiple Rotary clubs, covering different regions and municipalities, ensuring widespread impact and accessibility for educators.

This initiative reflects Rotary's commitment to empowering teachers with essential digital skills, ultimately improving the quality of education in public schools.



Mental Health Awareness

On August 6, 2024, the Rotary E-Club of Medicofusion and the Rotary Club of Rupandehi organized a three-hour Mental Health Awareness Program at Oxford College in Butwal. Chaired by Rtn. Pramod Panthi with Mr. Manoj Marasani as chief guest and Rtn. Dr. Bikram Kafle as facilitator, the session covered essential topics including stress management, suicide prevention, and identifying stress symptoms, with the goal of equipping students with healthy coping strategies.

On August 9, 2024, Nepal Mahila Magar Sang hosted a half-day Mental Health Awareness Program at Hotel Butwal View in Butwal to mark World Indigenous Day. The event, attended by 200 women, addressed crucial subjects such as mental health myths, suicide prevention, and common mental disorders, followed by an interactive Q&A session.

The series continued on August 12, 2024 with a half-day program at Naharpur School in Butwal, co-chaired by Sumina KC and Rtn. Dr. Bikram Kafle. This session focused on key mental health issues including stress management, suicide prevention, and drug abuse awareness.

Education Support to Rural Schools

On November 17th, the Rotary Club of Butwal Downtown delivered essential educational materials to Shree Saraswati Secondary School in Limgha, Gulmi—a remote village with limited resources. The donation included science models of human anatomy, a smart board, benches, stools, and other critical supplies, all aimed at enhancing learning opportunities for students.

With a total contribution of NPR 250,000 (in kind and cash), this initiative reflects the club's commitment to supporting

education in underserved rural areas, in line with Rotary's global literacy mission. Additionally, 15 dedicated club members volunteered a combined 360 hours (24 hours each) to ensure the project's success, directly benefiting 300 students.

As part of the program, the club also introduced the Rotary Four-Way Test to the school administration, promoting ethical values and integrity in education. This effort underscores Rotary's broader mission of community empowerment through sustainable development, ensuring long-term positive change in rural education.





Distribute 1,526 Bedkits to Dhunebesi Children in Pilot Project to improve the sleeping conditions of

The Rotary Club of Himalayan Golfers (RCHG), in collaboration with Sleeping Children Around the World (SCAW),

successfully concluded a pilot bedkit distribution project in Dhunebesi, Dhading. Over the course of four days, 1,526 bedkits were distributed to children aged 6 to 12 from 33 schools on November 24-27, 2025. Of these, 1,500 bedkits were generously provided by SCAW, while RCHG contributed an additional 26 kits to further enhance the initiative's impact.

The project, with a budget of \$60,000 CAD funded entirely by SCAW, aimed

to improve the sleeping conditions of children in underserved areas. RCHG took responsibility for covering all logistical expenses and managing the distribution process across nine strategically located centers. These centers ensured accessibility for children, many of whom traveled hours through challenging terrain to receive their kits.

The beneficiaries, all aged between 6 and 12, expressed immense joy and gratitude, as the bedkits provided them with essential comfort and warmth. This impactful project not only addressed immediate needs but also highlighted the importance of partnerships in creating lasting change.

Warm Clothes & School Bag Distribution

On January 2, 2025, through the coordination of the **Rotary Club of Tinkune Kathmandu** and with support from various Rotary Clubs and Rotarians, warm clothes and school bags were distributed to 455 students from three schools in Parbat District.

The initiative was made possible through collaborative efforts of multiple organizations and individuals. Participating Rotary Clubs included the Rotary Club of Bagmati Kathmandu, Rotary Club of Kathmandu, Rotary Club of Rudramati Kathmandu, Rotary Club of Biratnagar Midtown, and Rotary Club of Newroad City. Individual contributors featured Rotarians Shakila Pathak, Netra Basnet, Gautam Shrestha (Jhilke Hulaki), Dinesh Shrestha, Prithvi Vaidya, IP Dhakal, along with disability rights activist Krishna Gahatraj.

Cervical Cancer Screening: PAP Smear Test Initiative

The Rotary Club of Mahabouddha

successfully organized a Cervical Cancer Screening Program at Saraswati School in Godawari-12, Thecho, Lalitpur. This initiative, focused on PAP smear tests, was conducted in partnership with Thecho Mahila Jagaran Saving and Credit Cooperative and Godawari Municipality Thecho-12, with technical support from the Nepal Cancer Hospital and Research Center. District Governor Rtn. Rajendra Man Sherchan attended as the chief guest, underscoring the importance of early detection in fighting cervical cancer.

A total of 116 women participated, reflecting



the community's commitment to proactive healthcare. The program also provided education on cervical cancer, its risk factors, and the importance of regular screenings. Other notable attendees included Assistant Governor Rtn. Ariun Kumar Shrestha, Lalita Maharjan from Thecho Mahila Jagaran Cooperative, Ashesh Maharjan from Godawar i Municipality, eight medical professionals from Nepal Cancer Hospital, along with 9 Rotarians and 19 quests.

Furniture Distribution in Two Schools

On the auspicious occasion of Saraswati Puja, the Rotary Club of Palpa Lumbini organized a furniture distribution program at two supported schools in Palpa: Shree Saraswoti Secondary School in Tansen-7 and Shree Balkanya Bhagwati Adharbhut School in Tansen-10.

Fifty chairs were provided to Shree Saraswoti Secondary School, addressing the shortage of seating in its auditorium and ensuring students have proper accommodations during school programs. Meanwhile, Shree Balkanya School received ten sets of tables and benches to resolve the issue of overcrowded seating, where previously six students had to share a single bench.

With the support of Lumbini Medical College, the club successfully managed the project's total budget of approximately NPR 200,000. This initiative directly benefits students by improving their learning environment and eases the schools' financial burdens. By supplying these essential furnishings, the Rotary Club has enhanced the facilities at both schools, promoting a more seamless and enjoyable teaching and learning experience.



Three-day Eye Checkup

On January 21-23, 2025, the Rotary Club of Makawanpur, with support from the Rotary Club of Kathmandu Midtown and Tilganga Eye Hospital, organized eye camps in Bara and Makawanpur districts. On the first day in Bariyarpur, 328 people were screened, with 67 referred for cataract surgery. The next day, two camps were held—one in Inaruwasira (Bara), where 255 were screened (62 for surgery), and another in Thingan (Makawanpur), screening 60 (10 for surgery). On the final day, two more camps took place: in Ramdhuni (Hetauda), where 278 were examined (18 for surgery), and in Chisapani (Manahari), with 126 screened (8 for surgery). Club leaders, including President Rtn. Anil Agrawal and past presidents, coordinated the events.



Rotary Club Inaugurates Dandapani **Bhattarai** Bhawan

Prevention of Childhood Blindness by Operation of Fundus Camera &

Indirect Laser" in Premature.

The Rotary Club of Bagmati, in partnership with the Rotary Club of Las Vegas Won, implemented a \$48,239 Global Grant (GG#2352110) project from May to November 2024 to prevent blindness in premature babies at Nepal's Tilganga Institute of Ophthalmology.

The project provides critical equipment including a portable indirect laser for in-NICU retinal treatment, head-mounted ophthalmoscopes for precise therapy, and handheld fundus cameras for remote diagnosis of Retinopathy of Prematurity (ROP) – a major threat to infants born before 34 weeks weighing under 2kg.

Tilganga, serving over 1,300 daily

patients, can now offer better care to underprivileged families across Nepal. Funding came from multiple Rotary clubs including \$21,600 from Las Vegas Won and \$19,639 from Nepal-Bhutan District. During the November 19 handover ceremony, the equipment was delivered along with a NRs. 150,000 cheque to launch the Rotary Retina Support Program, attended by international Rotary representatives. Club leaders Manju Dhamala and Dr. Eli Pradhan Ranjitkar spearheaded this initiative to transform neonatal eye care in the region.

Coding & Robotics Curriculum

Previously, Rotary Club of Yala had conducted boot camps in three public schools in Godawari Municipality to gauge interest and feasibility. With technical support from **Dursikshya Education Network**, the project also established a fully equipped Kitini Innovation Lab, providing essential tools for students to build skills, foster creativity, and apply technology to real-world problems.



A Gift of Compassion: Wheelchair Donated to Cancer Patient in Paro

Mr. Yeshey, a villager from the scenic Tsento Valley in Paro, Bhutan, was diagnosed with stage 4 colon cancer. He was sent to Kolkata, India, for treatment, where he underwent a month of chemotherapy. However, doctors later determined that the cancer was too advanced to treat, and he was brought back to Bhutan.

Back in his village, Mr. Yeshey's condition worsened, leaving him increasingly immobile. Eventually, he needed assistance to be carried to the toilet and bath, making everyday life a struggle.

During a visit to the village, Rtn. Tobgay witnessed Mr. Yeshey's suffering firsthand. Shared Insights From PDGs



PDG Sanjay Giri Basic Education & Literacy Sub-committee Chair 2024-25

I was well aware of the work required for Literacy, having served as Co-Chair of the Committee for several years, starting in RY 2020–21. After assuming the role of Chair effective Rotary Year 2024–25, we focused on strengthening the Committee with the objective of maximizing service delivery despite limited resources. A key aim was to enhance these resources while advancing our work in Literacy through the T-E-A-C-H program (Teacher Support, E-Learning, Adult Literacy, Child Development, Happy Schools).

Since Rotary Year 2022–23, when the Basic Education & Literacy Committee became one of our District's main committees, we have collaborated with other committees and subcommittees to deliver educational services. Our year-end achievements have been highly satisfactory, with measurable progress in all five T-E-A-C-H areas:

- Approval of computer lab projects in 7 schools.
- Promotion of adult education, highlighted by our program for inmates at Bhimphedi Jail, Makwanpur.
- ICT training for 782 teachers across Nepal, with significant impact.
- Agreements to provide water projects, school uniforms, bags, and stationery to schools and children.

Our greatest achievement, however, has been the collaborations forged and the resources mobilized for Basic Education & Literacy:

- Mahalaxmi Development Bank: 15 toilets (Rs. 3,000,000)
- Everest Bank: 10 toilets (Rs. 2,500,000)
- Edu Tech: 7 computer labs (20 computers each, Rs. 3,500,000)
- Sanima Reliance Life Insurance: 1 toilet + adult education (Rs. 500,000)
- Surya Jyoti Life Insurance: Basic Education & Literacy (Rs. 1,000,000)
- Global Equity Fund Ltd.: Basic Education & Literacy (Rs. 500,000)

In conclusion, we have grown significantly and established a flagship program aligned with District goals and government priorities. Our vision is to expand collaborations, secure more resources, and reach underserved areas.

We stand united in making Basic Education & Literacy a top District priority. While progress has been made, much remains to be achieved—a goal possible only with the continued support of Rotarians (RID 3292), partners, and well-wishers.

As the DLF for 2024-2025, I organized the following programs: Train the Trainers (TTT), Assistant Governors' Learning Seminar (AGLS), District Team Learning Seminar (DTLS), Presidents-Elect Learning Seminar (PELS), District Learning Assembly (DLA), Grant Management Seminar (GMS), Membership & Public Image Seminar, The Rotary Foundation Seminar, and the Zone 6 Foundation Symposium-with Trustee Chair Mark Maloney as the Chief Guest. Additionally, I facilitated vibrant club workshops in Regions 4, 5, 6, and 7, along with other needbased programs.

All of this was made possible through the support of DG Rajendra Man Sherchan, District Leaders, and the Clubs.

Shared Insights

The Road Ahead: From Misconception to Recognition Rtn Amit Giri
District Public Image Committee Chair (2024–2025)

To truly serve our goal, we needed clarity. So, with the help of young Interactors, passionate Rotaractors, and seasoned Rotarians, we conducted a random survey among both Rotarians and non-Rotarians. We asked tough questions: How is Rotary perceived? Are our community projects being noticed? Are we speaking the language of impact, or are we lost in traditional communication?

The feedback was clear—and it was eye-opening. We discovered five major challenges: Rotary wasn't reaching the general public effectively. The attitude appeared too sophisticated and distant. Communication methods were traditional and outdated. Trust and transparency were lacking in public perception. Often, attention overtook the cause.

Armed with this reality check, we redefined our strategy. We set out three bold goals: Raise awareness about Rotary's work among non-Rotarians. Modernize communication, breaking free from traditional methods. Build trust through consistent and impactful visibility.

Our mission was rooted in one belief: Rotary is not just a club—it's a force for good. And this force deserves to be seen, heard, and felt. When it comes to Public Image, nothing speaks louder than action. And so, on World Polio Day, we launched a nationwide campaign that captured hearts and headlines alike.

Key highlights included the lighting of landmarks like Dharahara and the Sky Walk in Kathmandu with the "End Polio Now" message. Dharahara's projection mapping alone attracted over 15,000 walk-in visitors. A caller ringtone promoting polio awareness—created in partnership with Nepal's Ministry of Health—reached over 30 million mobile users across NTC and Ncell networks. Our videos were reshared by Rotary International, gaining global traction and celebrating Nepal's commitment to a polio-free world.

Community action was equally powerful, with over 700 cyclists and 500 rally participants joining from all regions. Events included candlelight vigils, cycle rallies, and street dramas. Public leaders, including the Minister for Health and Population and Miss Nepal World 2023, graced the campaign. Through digital, print, and broadcast platforms, the campaign's total estimated reach crossed 35 million, ensuring Rotary's message echoed across Nepal with strength and clarity.



Another landmark initiative was our Corporate Interaction Program. Over 25 prominent corporate leaders attended a special dinner hosted by the Public Image Committee with support from the CSR Committee. The goal was to initiate meaningful partnerships between Rotary and the private sector, channeling CSR funds into impactful, transparent, and sustainable community development projects. This wasn't a one-off event—it marked the beginning of an ongoing initiative to integrate Rotary into the national development dialogue, where business meets benevolence.

Membership Development Progress Rtn Subash Sigdel District Membership Chair (2023-2025)

Brief overview of the membership development progress in this year. Under the inspiring theme "The Magic of Rotary," RID 3292 has acted positively, proactively, and purposefully to strengthen membership and expand Rotary's impact. Clubs have embraced innovation, connection, and service — truly bringing the magic alive through action.

- Training & Workshops: Organized district-level membership seminars and zone-wise strategy sessions to build leadership and club capacity.
- Retention Focus: Introduced mentorship programs, club health checkups, and flexible meeting models to improve member satisfaction and retention.
- New Club Formation: Identified strategic areas for club expansion and supported new club chartering.
- Youth Transition: Promoted Rotaract-to-Rotary transition pathways to bring in energetic young professionals.

Information & Technology Annual Summary Rtn Chhongba Sherpa District IT Committee Chair (2024–2025)

The District Information Technology Committee successfully achieved several key digital milestones during this Year, contributing to improved digital engagement, streamlined reporting, and better access to member and club data.





Key Achievements & Statistics

- Digital Directory Launch: The member and classification-based Digital Directory was successfully launched on July 1, 2024, following a development phase that began in March 2024.
- •Club Data Updates: Approximately 90% of clubs updated their profiles, executive boards, and member data on the district platform, significantly improving the accuracy and reliability of our digital records.
- Mobile App Adoption: As of June 2025, around 4,298 Rotarians—representing approximately 76% of the total district membership—are actively using the District 3292 Mobile App. A total of 1,501 iOS users and 2,797 Android users joined, reflecting strong year-on-year growth in digital adoption.
- Monthly Reporting System: A new digital reporting platform was introduced for club-level monthly submissions. 34 clubs actively utilized the system, uploading reports, supporting documents, and media files—thus helping establish a centralized and accessible digital archive for the district.
- Growth in Web Presence: The district website saw a substantial increase in unique monthly visitors, rising from 1,000 to over 3,500. Visitors accessed the site from across Nepal, India, the USA, Australia, the UK, and Canada, indicating growing global engagement.
- Digital Training Initiatives: Introductory digital orientation sessions were conducted during PELs and AGLs. Additionally, a successful mock IT workshop was held for Region 1(16 clubs).

Behind The District Governor



Rtn. Ashok Nath Pyakuryal (ANP), District Secretary, and Rtn. Ashok Kapali (AK), Additional District Secretary of Rotary District 3292 (Nepal-Bhutan), recently sat down with the GML and Publication Team to reflect on the successes and lessons of this Rotary Year. In an exclusive conversation, both Ashoks shared insights into the planning, execution, and key takeaways from their roles as Secretaries during 2024-25.

The District Secretary works closely with the District Governor, often behind the scenes. What inspired you to take up the role of District Secretary/Additional Secretary for Rotary District 3292?

ANP: I have been a Rotarian for more than 20 years. The opportunity to serve as District Secretary is not only a great honor but also a serious responsibility. It offered me a platform to serve beyond the club level and engage with a wider network of dedicated Rotarians.

AK: We were nominated—in fact, it was our club and our District Governor (DG) who inspired us to work at the district level as Rotarians, contributing to meaningful causes for the people and the community.

How would you summarize your tenure in one sentence?

ANP: It has been a journey of dedication, collaboration, service, strengthening bonds, and creating impact across the district—though not without its

challenges.

AK: Amazing Rotarians, inspiring people, dedicated service projects, smiles, cherished moments, and mutual respect.

What were the most memorable projects/initiatives you supported during your term?

ANP: Many clubs, especially in smaller towns, took on truly praiseworthy initiatives. One that stands out was an Interact Club's visit to an orphanage. They asked the children to write wish lists, and although the Interactors initially struggled to arrange the resources, they promised the children their wishes would be fulfilled by year's end. When we learned about this, we quickly mobilized support to help fundraise, and ultimately, we fulfilled every wish. That moment gave the children hope and reminded us all that dreams are still worth dreaming. AK: If you're asking about our most memorable projects, they include wastewater management, tree plantation drives, girls' sanitation facilities (toilets), the nutrition (egg) project, and the Mustang cleaning initiative.

Was there a particular moment or success that made you proud as a District Secretary?

ANP: Simply fulfilling my responsibilities smoothly gave me a deep sense of fulfillment. I'm grateful to have contributed to keeping the Rotary wheel turning as we transition into the next Rotary year, 2025-2026.

AK: Every visit, every meeting, and every moment working as a District Joint Secretary fills me with pride.

What were the biggest challenges you faced in this role? (e.g., logistics, communication, member engagement)

ANP: Time management and streamlining communication across multiple responsibilities were likely the most significant challenges.

AK: I believe communication remains one of our key challenges.



We need to encourage our district to ensure concerned Rotarians respond promptly. We could save considerable time by becoming more proficient with e-communication, quick responses, and digital-friendly practices.

How did you handle disagreements or conflicts within the district leadership or clubs?

ANP: Thankfully, such situations were rare. But when they did arise, I found that listening to everyone and guiding conversations back to our shared purpose of service and unity made a significant difference.

AK: I didn't witness any disagreements or conflicts during our tenure. What we consistently observed and felt was mutual respect. As I see it, when there's respect, conflicts simply don't arise.

How did you balance Rotary responsibilities with personal/ professional commitments?

ANP: It wasn't always easy, but my prior experience and involvement in other organizations helped me significantly. Ultimately, it comes down to knowing how to prioritize your responsibilities.

AK: This was truly a challenging benchmark for us. As professionals in our respective fields, it was sometimes crucial to manage both commitments simultaneously.

However, we managed it successfully with the invaluable support and cooperation from family members, friends, our club members, district officials, and fellow Rotarians.

What skills or mindset should the next District Secretary prioritize?

ANP: Maintaining accessibility and approachability for every member and club is crucial – along with ensuring clear and timely communication.

AK: A well-planned schedule, prompt communication, persuasive leadership, and full support from all concerned parties will help create a landmark tenure.

What's your personal takeaway from this experience?

ANP: I'm humbled by the incredible work people accomplish with limited resources in the name of service. This experience has taught me that true leadership stems from empathy rather than position or authority.

AK: A strong network, valuable connections, countless blessings, and abundant smiles – these are what truly matter.

Any final message to Rotarians in District 3292?

ANP: Never underestimate the value of your contribution, whether big or small. Every act of service, regardless of scale, represents a significant achievement. AK: I believe only those with good souls can be true Rotarians. My request to all concerned is to nurture goodness within yourselves - this is how we create better lives for others while giving our very best.
