I remember the exact moment when I realized the power of Rotary's youth programs. It was a Saturday morning in Australia during my year as a Rotary Youth Exchange student. I stood among a group of young leaders at a Rotary Youth Leadership Awards event. The organizers challenged us to stand on a large tarp spread across the floor and, without stepping off, find a way to fold it in half.

At first, the task seemed simple. But as we moved, strategized, and adjusted, the reality set in — it required teamwork, agility, and constant communication.

Rotaractors and Rotarians guided us, but no one dictated how to succeed. The decisions were ours to make. And then something remarkable happened. Without being instructed, we collectively decided that no one would be left behind as our space on the tarp shrank.

One of our teammates was a person who uses a wheelchair, giving us an opportunity to adapt, ensuring that he was fully part of the experience. We shifted, lifted the tarp, and reconfigured our positions, using our time to think, plan, and act as a team. In

the end, we successfully completed the challenge together.

As we celebrated our success, one participant said, "Society works the same way — challenges will come, but instead of leaving people behind, we must find ways to include everyone." It was such a profound thought for someone so young, yet it perfectly captured the essence of our experience.

Interact empowers young people to create service projects with real and lasting impact. Youth Exchange builds global citizens who return home with broader perspectives and stronger leadership skills. RYLA develops young leaders equipped to inspire and mobilize others. All of this is The Magic of Rotary, emerging through the actions of youth. These programs are the heart of Rotary's ability to grow and adapt in a changing world.



At one point, before the program began, we faced a delay in the delivery of some awards and certificates. Thanks to our contingency plan—including standby presenters and revised scripting—the emcee adjusted the flow seamlessly, maintaining momentum and audience engagement without awkward gaps.

Here, I must commend Emcee DS Ashok Nath Pyakurayal for his foresight and flexibility in handling last-minute surprises. His efforts not only saved the day but also provided valuable lessons for future events



Which clubs or individuals stood out the most this year, and what made their contributions exceptional?

Now that the award ceremony has concluded, all clubs within District 3292 are aware of the results and winners. The dedication and hard work of these winners were the highlights of the ceremony, as their standout contributions from various clubs truly set them apart and elevated the event.

It's important to remember that in every competition, there are winners—those whose efforts stood out this time. However, not winning does not mean failure; it means there is room to grow, reflect, and return stronger.

What is your final message to the Rotarians of District 3292 Nepal-Bhutan as we wrap up this year's awards and look ahead to the next Rotary year?

I regret not being able to stay longer after the ceremony to receive your valuable feedback, as I had to depart earlier than I would have liked.

As we close this year's award ceremony, our hearts swell with pride for what we've achieved together, while our gaze remains fixed on the future and its possibilities. Let us remember that every contribution matters, no matter how small, and that our greatest accomplishments still lie ahead.

The Heartfelt **Impact** of Rotary **Members' Actions and Contributions**

Rinchen Dema's life had already been marked by resilience. After losing her legs in a tragic accident, she refused to give up. With the support of the Royal Government's health system, she was fitted with artificial limbs at Gidakom Hospital, allowing her to walk again with crutches. As a devoted homemaker and mother of three, she managed her household with quiet strength while her husband worked tirelessly in the fields to provide for their family.

But fate struck another cruel blow when a devastating fire consumed their home-and with it, Rinchen's precious artificial limbs. Overnight, her world shrank. Immobilized and confined indoors, even the simplest tasks became unbearable struggles. No longer able to care for her family, she felt the crushing weight of helplessness. Her husband, now torn between work and home, had no choice but to stay by her side, leaving their already fragile

livelihood in jeopardy.

Then, hope arrived in the form of Rtn. Kesang Tshomo, the Agricultural Chair of our Rotary Club. While visiting the remote village of Mingiwong in Martshala, Samdrup Jongkhar, she encountered Rinchen's family and was deeply moved by their plight. Confused as to why Rinchen hadn't sought replacement limbs—a service provided free of charge at Gidakom Hospital—she listened intently to their heartbreaking story.

The truth was agonizingly simple: poverty had trapped them. With no steady income, the cost of traveling to Thimphu was insurmountable. The husband, now the sole caretaker, couldn't leave his wife and youngest child behind, and their two older children were in school. The free medical care might as well have been a world away.

But Rtn. Kesang refused to let their despair go unanswered. With warmth and determination, she asked, "If we arrange everything-transport, hospital stay, and food-will you go?" For the first time in months, Rinchen's eyes sparkled with hope. "Yes," she whispered, her voice trembling with emotion. The only remaining barrier was the travel expenses.

Without hesitation, Rtn. Kesang sprang into action. She reached out to fellow Rotarians and friends through WhatsApp, sharing Rinchen's story with urgency and compassion. The response was nothing short of miraculous. In just a short time, Nu 32,005 (USD 370+) poured in-enough to cover their journey to Thimphu, their stay at Gidakom Hospital, and even recovery time with relatives before returning home.

A week later, a transformed family returned to their village-not just with new medical support, but with renewed hope. Though Rinchen's rehabilitation was not yet complete due to the delay in treatment, she was back on the path to mobility, equipped with crutches and a future plan for new artificial limbs.

This is the power of Rotary. It's not just about funds or logistics—it's about changing lives, one act of kindness at a time. Because of Rtn. Kesang's compassion and the collective generosity of Rotarians, a family once trapped in despair now faces a brighter tomorrow.

This is service above self. This is Rotary in action.

Inauguration of CT Scan Machine at Scheer Memorial Hospital, Banepa

Hon. Kanchan Chandra Bade, Member of Parliament of the Bagmati Provincial Assembly and former minister; District Governor Rajendra Man Sherchan; Shanti Ratna Shakya, Mayor of Banepa Municipality; Gregory Hodgson of Advent Health and Global Health Initiatives; RRFC and International Primary Contact Sandra Hemstead; Dr. Sandesh Maskey, representative of the Washington Nepal Health Foundation; and Dr. Hector Gayares, Jr., CEO of the hospital, jointly inaugurated the CT Scan Machine in a ribbon-cutting ceremony on 7 May 2025.

District Governor Rajendra Man Sherchan emphasized Rotary's ongoing contributions to health, education, and other development projects in Nepal. "Rotary International District 3292 is proud to be associated with the installation and handover of this CT scan machine, which will benefit approximately 1.5 million people in the region," he said.

The event was attended by District Governor-Elect Binod Koirala, Past District Governors Sanjay Giri and Jitendra Bahadur Rajbhandari, District Governor-Nominee Bishnu Karki, DRFC Kumud Tripathi, and Rotarians from the



Rotary Clubs of Kopundol and Kavre-Banepa.

The hospital has introduced a state-of-the-art 160-slice CT scan machine as part of a global grant project worth \$459,065 (approximately NPR 6.1 crore). The project also included the procurement of a generator and transformer to ensure uninterrupted power supply for the machine.

With this advanced diagnostic tool, the hospital will now provide higher-quality healthcare services to 1.5 million people in

Kavre and neighboring districts, including Sindhupalchowk, Dolakha, Ramechhap, Okhaldhunga, and Sindhuli.

The Rotary Club of Bonita Beach Sunset, Florida, USA, led the fundraising efforts. Major donors included The Rotary Foundation, Advent Health Rocky Mountain Region, Adventist Health International, Loma Linda University (USA), and the Washington Nepal Health Foundation. The project was also generously supported by multiple Rotary Districts and Clubs across the USA.



Free Health Camp in Khilang, Kaski

The Rotary Club of Naxal Shakti is delighted to share the successful completion of a Free Health Camp in Khilang, Kaski, jointly organized by the Rotary Club of Naxal Shakti, Rotaract Club of Pokhara GMC, and Rotaract Club of Naxal Shakti.

The camp was technically supported by Gandaki Medical College, with logistical management by Khilang Thanku Deurali Youth Club and Thanku Deurali Khilang Aama Samuha. During the panel discussion, moderated by the NMA, these partners addressed questions from journalists, medical professionals, embassies, INGOs, NGOs, and other Kathmandu-based stakeholders working with communities and individuals in the Terai region.

Mental Health : Glimmers and Stigma

The program focused on educating participants about mental health conditions, including depression, and provided guidance on managing difficult mental health situations. Members learned about the causes of mental health challenges, when to seek help, and how to support those facing such issues. Key dos and don'ts were discussed in detail, helping participants better understand and address mental health concerns.

Budget: Approximately NPR 10,000

Impact: The session helped clarify common misconceptions about mental health problems. An important takeaway was reinforcing that mental health struggles are normal and should be treated like any other health issue, reducing stigma. Participants also gained practical knowledge on how to assist individuals dealing with mental health challenges, including essential dos and don'ts.





Wheelchair Distribution Program

Continuing its efforts to uplift and support individuals with physical disabilities, the Rotary Club of Surunga—in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Kathmandu Metro and Latter-Day Saint Charities—successfully distributed five high-quality, adjustable wheelchairs to beneficiaries in Kanakai Municipality on May 3, 2025.

The wheelchairs were delivered directly to recipients' homes, ensuring accessibility and a personalized handover in the presence of their respective ward chairpersons. Eye Examination Camp

RC Central Banke | December 29 & 30, 2024

Rotary Club of Central Banke, Vision Eye Hospital, Luciano & Friends, and Mugu Khattyad Gaupalika Ward No. 11 jointly organized an eye examination camp at Khattyad Health Post, Mugu on Poush 14 and 15 (December 29 and 30). A total of 300 individuals above 40 years of age underwent eye checkups during the camp.

The examination, conducted by a team led by Ophthalmic Assistant Chandra Bir Budha, identified cataracts in 60 people, along with other vision-related issues such as refractive errors and blepharitis in the remaining participants. Among the attendees, 110 were women.

Patients diagnosed with cataracts will undergo free surgeries, supported by the local municipality. Additionally, those referred for further treatment in Nepalgunj will receive 50% financial assistance from the Rotary Club and Vision Eye Hospital.



Community Resting Pavilion (Chautari)

Under its Public Image Program, the Rotary Club of Tilottama Rupandehi has constructed a community resting pavilion (Chautari) in Buddhanagar, Ward No. 11 of Butwal Sub-Metropolitan City—a densely populated area where senior citizens and children lacked a peaceful, open, and shaded space for social harmony.

The project has positively influenced the community's perception of Rotary.

Nutrition Basket Distribution for Burn survivors at Kirtipur Hospital RC Jawalakhel Manjushree | May 7, 2025

Kirtipur Hospital, established in 2006, is a 100-bed community teaching hospital offering various specialties, including a super-specialty Burn and Plastic Surgery service. It provides many services free of charge or at subsidized rates, focusing on care for the poor and vulnerable, and collaborates closely with local authorities.

Burns Violence Survivors Nepal (BVS-Nepal), founded in 2008, supports survivors of burns caused by accidents and violence—including domestic violence and acid attacks. It provides medical treatment, counseling, nutrition support, physiotherapy,

and vocational training to help survivors reintegrate into society. To date, BVS-Nepal has assisted over 8,500 burn victims.

Nutrition baskets are crucial for burn patients because severe burns create a hypermetabolic state, significantly increasing caloric and nutrient needs to support wound healing and recovery. Without adequate nutrition, patients face impaired healing and higher risks of complications.

The nutrition packets distributed at Kirtipur Hospital included eggs, biscuits, fruits, sattu juice, chocolates (enough for a week), and

other essentials to support eight survivors, with special provisions for children's recovery.

The Rotary Club of Jawalakhel Manjushree has been a consistent supporter of BVS-Nepal survivors, partnering to provide nutrition baskets and other assistance. We wish them a speedy recovery.

Their collaboration helps raise awareness, mobilize resources, and support rehabilitation programs for burn survivors, demonstrating a strong commitment to the community.

Free Mega Health Camp

RC New Road City | May 3, 2025

The Rotary Club of New Road City, in collaboration with the Innerwheel Club of New Road City, Chettrapati Free Clinic, Muthi Dan Pasa Pucha, and Nyata Tuladhar Samiti, successfully organized a Free Mega Health Camp on May 3, 2025, at Tuladhar Party Palace, Bhudrakhel.

Empowering Inclusive Education for Children with Disabilities in Humla

RC Rudramati | May 2025

Rotary Clubs of Rudramati Kathmandu (RI 3292) and Wreak Valley (RI 1070) are jointly supporting an Inclusive Education Resource Centre in Humla through Global Grant GG2349841. The project serves disabled children in one of Nepal's most remote regions.

Located at 10,000 feet, Humla is only accessible by plane or 4-day trek, with villages cut off for months annually. Children with disabilities face severe exclusion and lack of services. The area has high blindness rates from vitamin A deficiency and UV exposure. Many disabled children become abandoned after parents die, living isolated on village margins.

Himalayan Education and Development (HEAD) Nepal, founded by visually impaired advocate Chittup Lama, established a mobile school in 2011 that became a residential Resource Center in 2022. The Rotary partnership strengthens this facility.

Supported by DDF 1070 and Rotary Clubs Monmouth, Orkney, Stornoway, and Melton Mowbray Belvoir, the project currently benefits 50 disabled children (5-15 years old), with potential to serve more across Karnali Province. Ishu Subba is RC Rudramati's project

TARL (GG #2453679) Training for 2nd Phase School Teachers

RC Yala | May 9-18, 2025

The Rotary Club of Yala successfully conducted the Teaching at the Right Level (TARL) training for primary teachers at the Nepal Administrative Staff College from May 9 to 18, 2025. This Global Grant project, implemented in collaboration with international partners—the Rotary Club of Aachen-Frankenburg (Germany) and the Rotary Club of Hilversum-West (Netherlands)—aims to improve learning outcomes by tailoring instruction to students' varying skill levels.

The second-phase training brought together 60 teachers (8 male and 52 female) from 17 schools across Lalitpur and Kavre districts. Participants specialized in three core subjects: Nepali (16 teachers), English (20), and Mathematics (23). Through interactive sessions, they acquired practical methodologies to address diverse learning needs, ensuring all students master foundational skills. The training was supported by four resource persons from Street Child of Nepal, along with three mentors and RC Yala's focal representatives from each participating school.

The program began with an introduction to TARL's core principles, emphasizing the importance of individualized learning and the role of assessments in guiding instruction. Participants learned techniques for conducting formative assessments, measuring student progress, and analyzing

data to plan targeted interventions. They also explored differentiated instruction strategies, including grouping students by ability level, designing adaptable lesson plans, and fostering inclusive classroom environments. Teachers were equipped with 17 teaching tools for Nepali and English, along with 37 specialized tools for Mathematics.

Interactive workshops engaged participants through group discussions, role-playing, and peer feedback. Case studies and simulations provided hands-on practice in applying TARL methods, while daily feedback sessions helped address implementation challenges. By the training's conclusion, participants had formed a supportive professional network for ongoing collaboration and resource sharing.

Many expressed confidence in applying TARL strategies in their classrooms and pledged to mentor colleagues, extending the program's impact beyond primary education.

The closing ceremony honored attendees, with Chief Guest AG Suresh Prasad Acharya distributing certificates to participants and trainers. Project Coordinator PP Pramod Pradhan extended gratitude to all contributors—including international partners, trainers, school administrators, and RC Yala members—for their commitment to advancing Nepal's educational standards. This initiative stands as a significant step toward addressing the country's need for skilled teachers and improving foundational learning in public schools.



Water Supply Scheme and Latrine Hygiene Support for Shree Bhawani Secondary School, Nuwakot

RC Tripureswor

The Rotary Club of Tripureswor has supported the construction of a water supply scheme and latrine hygiene maintenance at Shree Bhawani Secondary School in Kagati Gaun, Kakani Municipality, Nuwakot.

More than 350 students and 20 teachers now benefit from a clean drinking water supply, sourced from a spring catchment located 1.5 kilometers from the school.

This initiative was made possible through:

Free Cervical Cancer Screening Camp in Nagarjun **Municipality** 2024-2025. However, Rotary Club of Bagmati

RC Bagmati | May 22, 2025

The Rotary Club of Bagmati Kathmandu, in collaboration with Nagarjun Municipality and the Nepal Cancer Relief Society (Kathmandu Branch), organized a one-day free Cervical Cancer Screening Camp (VIA Test) at Sitapaila Health Post, Ward No. 4, Nagarjun Municipality.

This was the 3rd and final cervical cancer screening camp in Nagarjun Municipality for Kathmandu and Nagarjun Municipality have agreed to conduct at least four such camps this fiscal year. Two wards have already been screened, with positive cases referred for thermocoagulation.

The camp was supported by a 6-member team from Nepal Australia Cervical Cancer Foundation led by Dr. Kasturi Malla, and Lions Club of Kathmandu Ashoka.

A total of 91 women from the community, including 2 referred patients, were screened. Among them, 13 tested positive and received

thermocoagulation treatment, 17 were diagnosed with general infections, and the remaining 61 showed normal results.

The screening data revealed that Ward No. 4 has a slightly higher prevalence of cervical cancer compared to previously screened Ward No. 3 and Ward No. 7. Based on these findings, the Ward Chairman and Health Executives were advised to prioritize awareness campaigns, expand screening efforts, and ensure follow-up care in this area.
