Rotary for Basic Education and Literacy

Each September, Rotary International (RI) observes Basic Education and Literacy Month, one of the seven core areas of focus that guide Rotary's global service initiatives. Education is recognized not only as a fundamental human right, but also as a cornerstone of sustainable development. Yet, millions of children and adults worldwide still lack access to quality schooling and essential literacy skills


To address this challenge, the Basic Education and Literacy Rotarian Action Group (BELRAG) serves as a global network dedicated to advancing educational equity. BELRAG supports Rotary clubs and districts by raising awareness, developing strategic plans, and facilitating impactful projects that promote inclusive and lifelong learning.

To advance Basic Education and Literacy, the District Governor of Rotary International District 3292 has outlined a set of strategic goals for the Rotary Year 2025-2026. These include:

- Establishing e-learning centres and computer labs in at least 20 community schools
- Organizing teacher training programs to enhance instructional quality
- Constructing girls' toilets and changing rooms in a minimum of 20 community schools

These initiatives reflect Rotary's commitment to equitable access, digital inclusion, and gender-sensitive infrastructure in education.

Rotary International District 3292, encompassing Nepal and Bhutan, has embraced the mission of Basic Education and Literacy with unwavering commitment and innovation. The district has established basic education and literacy committees and conducted orientation seminars to empower Rotary clubs in designing impactful, locally relevant projects.



Through the Rotary Nepal Literacy Mission (RNLM), it has built a unified platform that integrates functional literacy, teacher support, and school adoption programs. RNLM's flagship initiative—the T-E-A-C-H program—advances this vision by addressing five key pillars: Teacher support, E-learning, Adult literacy, Child development, and Happy schools.

With the ambitious goal of achieving 100 percent literacy by 2030, RNLM continues to inspire collaborative action across Nepal and Bhutan, reaffirming Rotary's global commitment to inclusive and transformative education.

The TEACH program is a central component of the Rotary Nepal Literacy Mission, aimed at enhancing the quality of education in adopted schools. Its interventions are organized around five interconnected pillars, each addressing a vital aspect of teaching and learning.

Teacher Support

Enhancing teaching quality is central to the TEACH framework. Teachers receive training in child-cantered pedagogy, classroom management, and online instruction reflecting the growing importance of digital education. Schools are equipped with educational materials and stationery, while the Happiness Excellence Program (HEP) fosters well-being and motivation among both teachers and students.

E-Learning

Embracing technology, the program establishes and upgrades e-learning centres. Computers, software, and digital resources help bridge the gap between traditional classrooms and modern learning tools, empowering both students and educators.

Adult Literacy:

TEACH extends education to adults who missed formal schooling. Communities are surveyed to identify learners, and literacy classes are organized with appropriate materials. In some areas, these are paired with skill-development or income-generating training especially for women promoting both confidence and economic independence.

Child Development:

The program supports children's holistic growth through health check-ups, provision of stationery and uniforms, and re-enrolment of school dropouts. By addressing barriers beyond academics, TEACH ensures children are not only enrolled but nurtured to thrive.

Happy School:

This initiative transforms schools into safe, child-friendly spaces. Rotary clubs adopt schools and improve infrastructure building libraries, desks, toilets, and play areas, while ensuring clean drinking water. Some schools also introduce yoga, meditation, and well-being activities to support emotional healt

Additional Efforts by the District

Rotary clubs in District 3292 have significantly improved school infrastructure by constructing classrooms, providing furniture, establishing libraries and computer labs, and installing separate toilets with sanitary facilities for girls. These efforts have helped reduce dropout rates and foster safer, more inclusive learning environments.

To address economic barriers, clubs offer scholarships to underprivileged students especially girls and marginalized children enabling them to continue their education. Simultaneously, vocational training programs in tailoring, computing, and entrepreneurship empower youth and women to achieve economic independence. Recognizing that teachers are the cornerstone of effective learning, clubs have organized training workshops to enhance pedagogical skills and classroom practices. They have also donated books, digital learning kits, and teaching resources, creating vibrant and engaging learning spaces. A notable example is the Rotary Readers program by the Rotary Club of Lalitpur Midtown, which pairs volunteers with children to cultivate reading habits in early grades directly contributing to improved literacy outcomes.

Rotary's literacy efforts extend beyond schools. In rural areas, functional literacy programs have enabled adults particularly women to learn to read, write, and manage daily tasks with greater confidence. Under RNLM, many clubs have adopted communities and conducted adult literacy classes, often inspiring parents to become more supportive of their children's education. This fosters a positive cycle of learning within households.

District-Level Impact

RI District 3292 has implemented a range of impactful initiatives, including the adoption of government schools in remote areas, reconstruction of classrooms damaged by the 2015 earthquake, and collaboration with international Rotary clubs to secure Global Grants for literacy advancement.

A notable example is the Rotary Club of Pokhara Newroad, which has adopted Mahendra Secondary School in Gharmi and continues to support its educational programs. Similarly, the Rotary E-Club of District 3292 has partnered with overseas clubs to deliver vocational training and community-based literacy programs demonstrating how local efforts can be scaled through international collaboration and district-level coordination.

The success of these literacy projects hinges on strong partnerships. Rotary clubs across the district work closely with local governments, NGOs, schools, and global Rotary networks. While Global Grants provide access to modern teaching tools and resources, local engagement ensures long-term sustainability. District committees also play a vital role in monitoring progress and enhancing impact over time.

As we observe Basic Education and Literacy Month, it is vital to reflect on both the progress made and the challenges that remain. Rotary International District 3292 has demonstrated that investing in schools, training teachers, supporting students, and empowering communities can lead to transformative change in literacy and education. This year, every Rotary club is called upon to renew its commitment by adopting at least one literacy initiative whether through scholarships, classroom resources, teacher training, or community education.

By strengthening the foundations of learning, Rotarians are not only teaching people to read and write, but also helping build resilient, hopeful, and self-reliant communities across Nepal and Bhutan. Together, we can ensure that literacy becomes not merely an aspiration, but a shared achievement for all.

Basic Education & Literacy—Interaction on Literacy Projects Program

Best Western Plus Kathmandu Hotel September 8, 2025





The District Committee on Basic Education & Literacy (BE&L), Rotary International District 3292, successfully organized an Interaction on Literacy Projects on September 8, 2025, at Best Western Plus Kathmandu Hotel, Pingalsthan.

The program began with the arrival of participants, followed by a welcome address from DGE Rtn. Vishnu B. Karkee, Member of the Core Committee, and an opening address by DG Rtn. Binod Koirala, RI District 3292. A presentation on literacy and RID 3292 priorities was made by Mr. Joca du Toit, Country Representative of UNESCO, while Rtn. Rajesh Thapa, Member Secretary of the BE&L Committee, shared an overview of the committee's activities and projects.

The event highlighted the T-E-A-C-H Program and its five core areas: Teacher Training & Support, E-Learning, Adult Literacy, Child Development, and Happy Schools. This session was jointly facilitated by PP Rtn. Tirtha Raj Dahal, PP Rtn. Nishchal Bahadur Shrestha, PP Rtn. Ram Piyari Basnet, PP Rtn. Bimal Lal Shrestha, and PP Rtn. Subhakar Baidhya.

DGN Dr. IP Dhakal gave his remarks, then Dr. Bhagabati Sedain from the Nexus Institute of Research and Innovation and Dr. Dhruba Raj Regmi, National Program Coordinator of UNESCO Nepal, followed with a presentation, while Dr.

Neven Knezevic, Education Chief of UNICEF Nepal, shared UNICEF's education initiatives. Mr. Dinesh Ghimere, Director of CEHRD, Government of Nepal, presented the National Non-Formal Education and Lifelong Learning Framework.

The program concluded with a session on the Way Forward for the TEACH Program and priorities for 2025–26, delivered by PDG Rtn. Sanjay Giri, Chair of the Basic Education & Literacy Committee.

Background

- Rotary in Nepal began in 1959 with the establishment of the Rotary Club of Kathmandu.
- · Over the decades, Rotary has been active in health, education, water, and sanitation projects.
- Rotary International District 3292 was formed on 1 July 2008.
- Nepal was declared polio-free on 7 May 2014.
- In 2012, Rotary helped declare South Asia totally literate.
- The Rotary Nepal Literacy Mission (RNLM) was established and later merged (2022–23) into Basic Education & Literacy (BE&L).

BE&L Structure

- Working Team 5 T-E-A-C-H Coordinators & 7 Regional Coordinators.

T-E-A-C-H Program Components

- T Teacher Support: Training & recognition programs.

In Nepal, while primary school enrollment is nearly universal, dropout rates remain high, with almost half of children not continuing beyond middle school—a challenge Rotary is working to address.

Our District's Basic Education & Literacy (BE&L) Committee has been at the forefront of this mission, with programs like T-E-A-C-H, WASH in Schools, and Backto School, and has supported ICT projects, computer labs, toilets, and child-friendly schools across the country. Clubs are further encouraged to adopt government/community schools, promote adult literacy, strengthen child-friendly environments, and support school improvement plans. Funding support from BE&L, CSR partnerships with corporate financial institutions, and contributions from Rotarians have made these projects possible, with a target of NRs. 15 million for RY 2025-26.

This month, as we celebrate International Literacy Day on September 8, let us renew our commitment to building a literate Nepal—where no child is left behind, and education opens doors for a brighter future.

Focusing on Vision

RC Dharan Foothills August 29, 2025

The Rotary Club of Dharan Foothills, in collaboration with B. P. Koirala Institute of Health Sciences (BPKIHS) and Surya Eye Care, organized an Eye Health Camp at the Special Education Centre, Dharan. The camp aimed to identify and address vision-related issues among students with special needs, ensuring timely referral and care.

A total of 89 students were examined by a team of ophthalmologists, optometrists, and support staff. Among them, 17 were diagnosed with refractive errors and referred for cycloplegic refraction at a higher center. A few students with Down syndrome were found to have entropion causing recurrent conjunctivitis, which was treated, with advice for follow-up. Rtn. Dr. Ichhya Joshi also pledged to provide free follow-up care, ensuring continuity of treatment.

Parents and teachers were counseled on the importance of regular eye check-ups, hygiene, and adherence to treatment. The initiative highlighted Rotary's commitment to community service and showed the positive impact of collaborative healthcare programs in improving the well-being, learning, and quality of life of children with special needs



Menstruation Health & Hygiene Awareness Program

The Rotary Club of Biratnagar Central, in collaboration with the Rotaract Club of Biratnagar Central, successfully organized a Menstrual Health and Hygiene Awareness Program at Balika School for students of Classes 9 and 10. The program aimed to empower young girls with essential knowledge and practical guidance on menstrual health-a subject often overlooked or considered taboo in many communities.

During the session, facilitators provided clear information on safe menstrual hygiene practices, such as the use of clean sanitary materials, proper personal care during menstruation, and understanding the biological process of the menstrual cycle. They also addressed cultural myths and misconceptions that have long contributed to shame, restrictions, and unhealthy practices among adolescent girls.

The interactive session encouraged students to ask questions and share experiences openly, fostering a safe space for dialogue. Addressing both physical and psychological aspects of menstrual health, the program boosted students' confidence, self-esteem, and overall well-being.

In addition, the initiative emphasized the role of education in promoting gender equality and dignity, as menstrual health directly affects girls' school attendance, participation, and performance. By fostering awareness and open discussion, the Rotary and Rotaract Clubs helped equip these young students with the confidence and skills to manage their menstrual health safely and responsibly.

This awareness drive formed part of Rotary's broader commitment to community health, youth empowerment, and education, reflecting its mission to create meaningful and sustainable change at the grassroots level.



Snakebite Prevention Awareness Program

The school's administration expressed gratitude, noting the vital importance of the information for the community. To extend the program's impact, students and teachers will use smart boards to replicate the session in other classes, ensuring that knowledge of snakebite prevention reaches a wider audience, including families and the broader community.

This collaboration underscores the Rotary Club's commitment to community health and education. The total expense for the event was approximately Rs. 12,000.

Hub, New Baneshwor, to address the growing mental pressures in professional and social life.


The initiative was launched in response to rising levels of stress and trauma affecting people across Nepal and beyond. Uncertainty, compounded by exaggerated and unreliable media reports, had fueled public anxiety, leading to increased workplace stress, declining morale, and reduced productivity. Recognizing that these challenges also affected Rotarians, Rotaractors, and the wider community, the Club took proactive steps to provide support.

A total of 39 participants—including Rotarians, proposed Rotaractors, guests, and members joining online from abroad-attended the twohour session. Mental health experts Shreeya Dangol and Dipesh Tandukar from the FHEAL Institution led the program, offering counseling and guiding participants through practical stressrelief exercises designed to enhance emotional resilience.

Conducted on a budget of NRs. 16,130, the event underscored Rotary's commitment to impactful yet cost-effective initiatives that directly benefit members and the community.

The outcomes were highly positive. Participants reported feeling refreshed, motivated, and better equipped to apply coping strategies in their daily lives, as well as to share them with their families and communities. Many noted improved morale and greater confidence in facing workplace and personal challenges. By combining emotional well-being with Rotary fellowship, the program created lasting value for all attendees.





Mental Health Matters

RC Patan South September 18, 2025

As per the suggestion of PRIP Gordon R. McInally (RY 2023-24), the Rotary Club of Patan South initiated the Mental Health Wellness Program in 2023, which continues to date. When we think of mental health disorders, mild depression and anxiety often come to mind. These conditions alter the way we perceive the world, causing the brain to interpret small problems as much bigger or more threatening than they actually are.

There was no stigma attached to mental health disorders, and mild depression and anxiety could be effectively managed if patients consulted a psychiatrist early and followed prescribed medications. However, hesitation to seek help often led to prolonged suffering, making these disorders more severe.

Many famous personalities, such as Elon Musk, Justin Bieber, Deepika Padukone, J.K. Rowling, and Selena Gomez, have also struggled with



anxiety or depression. By openly sharing their experiences, they helped reduce the stigma associated with mental health issues.

Depression often began with tension headaches and stress. Patients lost interest in daily activities, found it difficult to concentrate, and felt sleepy even during the day. Some experienced a loss of appetite, while others engaged in binge eating. They withdrew from friends and family, which was distinct from the solitude one seeks for meditation. Anxiety, like depression, was a neurological disorder. It manifested as fear, restlessness, shortness of breath, and muscle tension.

Beyond these common conditions, mental health encompassed a wide range of disorders. Severe illnesses, such as schizophrenia and bipolar disorder, required longer-term medication and ongoing care. The Rotary Club of Patan South spent approximately NPR 150,000 annually to support about 40 patients each year. The program covered psychiatric consultations and medication. Patients with schizophrenia and bipolar disorder needed more frequent doctor visits, consistent medication, proper care, compassion, and strong family support. सर्वे भवन्त सखिनः

Recently, the Rotary Club of Changu established a computer lab at Shree Aajad Secondary School to enhance digital learning and provide students with access to information technology.

The ceremony was presided over by Club President Rtn. Ram Chandra Adhikari.

During the program, Project First Contact Person and First Vice President Rtn. Rajan Piya

delivered the welcome address, underlining that the successful execution of the project would significantly enhance community health, hygiene, and overall living standards in the target areas. Technical insights and details regarding the project's design, sustainability measures, and engineering considerations were presented by Rtn. Er. Guneshwar Mahato, highlighting the thorough planning and long-term benefits of the initiative.

This project was implemented under a Rotary Global Grant (GG2352639) in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Yokosuka, Japan, RI District 2780, exemplifying Rotary's commitment to international partnerships and transformative community development. The total estimated cost of the project amounted to \$40,572, with the Rotary Club of Chitwan contributing \$3,000 towards this effort.

Upon completion, the initiative is expected to

provide safe drinking water, improved sanita tion facilities, and hygiene services (WASH) to 175 households and one primary school serving 85 students in the Chamgha and Khasuwa villages. The project is anticipated to ensure sustainable access to clean water, improve public health, reduce the prevalence of waterborne diseases, and contribute to the long-term social and economic development of the community. This initiative reflects a holistic approach to enhancing quality of life and promoting resilience within the local population.





Hand Over of Sports Materials Global Grant #GG2453359

RC Biratnagar Downtown September 11, 2025

The project, implemented under Global Grant GG2453359, focused on encouraging the holistic development of students at Shiv Adharbhoot Vidhyalaya, Belgachi, by providing quality sports equipment. With financial support from the grant and active participation from members of the Rotary Club of Biratnagar Downtown, the initiative was carried out in coordination with the school administration on Thursday, 11th September, at a cost of NPR 39,200.

More than 300 students, along with teachers and the wider school community, benefited from the distribution of sports items, including football, volleyball, badminton, cricket, and indoor games. The project emphasized not only academics but also physical fitness, teamwork, and discipline, reflecting Rotary's commitment to sustainable community development. Immediately, students gained access to structured sports facilities that fostered enthusiasm and active participation, while in the medium term, the initiative is expected to enhance physical fitness, boost team spirit, and improve student morale.

In the long run, it aims to develop essential life skills such as leadership, discipline, and collaboration, contributing to a healthier and more confident generation. Sustainability has been ensured through the school management's commitment to maintaining and regularly using the sports equipment, the integration of sports into daily routines by teachers, and the promotion of inter-school competitions to extend the benefits to the broader community for years to come.



Computer Training for Teacher Global Grant #GG2453359

RC Biratnagar Downtown September, 2025

The project focused on enhancing digital literacy among teachers at Shiv Adharbhoot Vidhyalaya, Belgachi, enabling them to integrate technology effectively into their teaching methods. Conducted over 30 days in September with an investment of NPR 20,000, the training provided daily sessions covering basic computer skills, MS Office, internet usage, and digital teaching tools. Funded under Global Grant GG2453359 and facilitated by expert volunteers coordinated by the Rotary Club of Biratnagar Downtown, the program received full support from the school administration, ensuring smooth scheduling and participation.

The primary beneficiaries were the school's 25 teaching staff, who gained essential computer skills, while the secondary beneficiaries are the students, who will benefit from digitally enhanced teaching methods and improved learning experiences. The immediate outcome of the project is that teachers are now proficient in computer operations and digital tools, with medium-term impacts including the integration of technology into classrooms to improve lesson delivery and student engagement.



• September 13 - Visits were conducted to police posts at Dhapashi, Dharmasthali, Balaju, and the Traffic Police Post at Tripureshwor. At Thapathali Police Post, a site inspection was carried out, and discussions were held with the Inspector. At Dharmasthali, Police Inspector Mr. Humagain highlighted their needs, including the construction of a toilet, as the Balaju post was scheduled to shift there. Plans were made to supply paint and other essential materials.

The police and police stations have always stood as vital pillars for safeguarding community safety, maintaining law and order, and strengthening the bond of trust between citizens and the state. However, these institutions also face immense challenges in times of crisis. On September 9, 2025, during the Gen-Z protest, the Badegaon Police Office suffered severe damage, leaving the infrastructure unusable and the personnel struggling to continue their duties effectively. Recognizing the urgent need for support, the Rotary Club of Godawari took a proactive step to extend meaningful assistance for its reconstruction and revival.

The initiative was made possible through the collective efforts of several partners who came forward in solidarity. The Rotary Club of Kathmandu, the Rotary Club of Himalaya Gurkhas, the Rotary Club of Jawalakhel Manjushree, GRS School, and Godawari Village Resort all contributed to this noble cause, joining hands with the Rotary Club of Godawari to ensure that the police office could once again function as a safe and efficient space for law enforcement.

As part of the contribution, the Club handed over 10 bundles of Corrugated Galvanized Iron (CGI) sheets to support the repair of the building's damaged structure. In addition, essential office furniture was provided to replace what had been destroyed, allowing the officers to resume administrative work without further delay. To ensure that the

police personnel could live and work in dignity, the package also included kitchen utensils and bedding materials, both of which were crucial for restoring basic day-to-day needs that had been lost in the fire and destruction.

The official handover program was carried out in a dignified manner. RC Godawari Charter President Rtn. Youraj Roka led the proceedings, symbolizing the spirit of service and leadership that defines Rotary. The event was further graced by the presence of Assistant District Governor Mahendra Raj Bushal, New Club Advisor Achut Babu Ojha, NRCL Chair Rajendra Bam, and distinguished leaders from partner Rotary Clubs, whose active participation highlighted the unity and commitment of the wider Rotary family.

Police Beat Restoration

The reconstruction of the police beat in Ward No. 29 of Kathmandu Metropolitan City was successfully completed. The structure, which had been damaged during the recent protests, was rebuilt through the joint efforts of the Rotary Club of Dillibazar-Kathmandu, the Rotary Club of Bhadgaon, Ghattkulo Samaj, and several other organizations.

As part of the project, all damaged facilities were either repaired or replaced. Burnt beds, broken doors and windows, cupboards, fans, lighting, and water supply systems were restored, along with complete painting and finishing work. According to police officials, the upgraded unit was now able to deliver services more efficiently in a safer environment.

Just a week earlier, the Rotary Club of Dillibazar had also supported the nearby police circle by providing essential relief items, including food supplies, gas cylinders, stoves, and other necessities. This assistance had greatly improved the living conditions of the security personnel stationed there.

The collaborative reconstruction, achieved with active community participation, was expected to strengthen ties between the police and local residents. RC Naxal Shakti September 21, 2025

The Rotary Club of Naxal Shakti handed over a desktop computer, equipped with a 512 SSD, 16 GB RAM, H61 motherboard, i5 processor, 2 TB HDD, keyboard, mouse, and a 21" monitor, to the Chhorepatan Police Post, Pokhara. The system, with an actual market value of NRs. 30,973, was provided at a discounted cost of NRs. 25,000. This support has greatly contributed to helping the police post recover from the impacts of the Gen Z Movement while strengthening good relations with the Rotary Club of Naxal Shakti. The computer will enhance record-keeping, improve service delivery, and promote learning through community sharing. Moreover, this initiative has encouraged local engagement and fostered a stronger sense of collaboration between the community and law enforcement.

The installation of new aluminum doors and windows at Police Circle Satdobato, Lalitpur, was successfully completed on September 24, 2025, following damage during the Gen-Z movement. The restoration included six doors, eleven windows, and three ventilation windows for the entire building, carried out by RC Yala at a total cost of NPR 163,500.

With these improvements, the building is now fully functional and ready to resume its role in serving and protecting the community. Beyond structural repair, the project enhanced safety, improved working conditions, and restored confidence in a key public service institution.

This initiative reflects Rotary's broader commitment to national rebuilding. By restoring essential facilities in police stations, RC Yala demonstrated how collaborative action can support not only reconstruction but also the longterm development of the country.
