A Year to Remember 2025-26: My Journey as District Secretary

Serving as the District Secretary of Rotary District 3292 from 1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026 has been one of the most rewarding and memorable experiences of my Rotary journey.

Rotary District 3292 is one of the largest and most vibrant districts in the region, comprising 162 Rotary Clubs, 185 Rotaract Clubs, 200 Interact Clubs, and 100 Rotary Community Corps (RCCs). In this role, I had the privilege of serving as a vital link between the district governor, the district leadership team, district officers, and club presidents across the district. Effective coordination and communication with district officers and club leaders were among my primary responsibilities, ensuring the smooth implementation of district programs, timely dissemination of information, and successful execution of Rotary's goals and priorities.

Throughout the year, I had the opportunity to work closely with District Governor Binod Koirala, my dedicated colleague Anish Bajracharya, 42 Assistant Governors, 162 Club Presidents, more than 200 district officials, and over 12,000 members of the Rotary family. The Rotary year was marked by several significant and impactful events, including the District Governor Installation Ceremony, the Membership and Public Image Seminar, the Rotary Foundation (TRF) Seminar, multiple RYLA programs, the District Award Ceremony, and the grand District Conference held in Pokhara, which attracted approximately 1,500 participants from across the country. These events not only enhanced member engagement and leadership development but also created opportunities to share ideas, celebrate achievements, and strengthen fellowship among Rotarians and Rotaractors.

One of the most encouraging accomplishments during this tenure was the district's success in membership growth. While the district had experienced a decline in membership over the previous three years, this Rotary year witnessed a positive turnaround with the addition of nearly 300 new Rotarians, reflecting the collective efforts and

commitment of club leaders and district teams toward membership development and retention. Beyond organizational achievements, this year provided a unique opportunity to connect with people from diverse backgrounds, travel across different parts of the country, and build meaningful relationships nationwide. It was a period of personal growth, professional development, and continuous learning. At the same time, the year also brought moments of sorrow as we lost several beloved Rotary friends whose contributions and friendship will always be remembered. Their absence reminded us of the value of fellowship and the importance of cherishing every opportunity to serve together.

Looking back, I feel deeply grateful for the trust placed in me and for the chance to contribute to the growth and success of Rotary District 3292. The friendships formed, lessons learned, challenges overcome, and achievements celebrated have left a lasting impact on my life. Above all, serving alongside dedicated leaders, passionate volunteers, and thousands of Rotary family members has been a lifetime experience that I will always cherish with pride, gratitude, and fond memories. As I conclude this remarkable journey, I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to everyone who made this Rotary year successful and memorable.



From Charity to Systems Change: How Rotary Can Partner in Nepal's Reform Journey

Despite notable progress, these gains remain uneven and, in many cases, fragile. Deep-rooted structural challenges continue to constrain Nepal's ability to achieve inclusive and sustainable growth.

Nepal stands at the cross roads in its development trajectory. Over the past two decades, the country has made notable progress in reducing poverty, expanding access to education, and improving basic health services. According to the World Bank, the national poverty rate declined significantly between 2003 and 2019, while access to primary education and essential healthcare services has expanded across much of the country. Infrastructure development has also accelerated, with improved road connectivity and growing digital access linking previously isolated communities.

Despite notable progress, these gains remain uneven and, in many cases, fragile. Deep-rooted structural challenges continue to constrain Nepal's ability to achieve inclusive and sustainable growth. Youth underemployment remains persistently high, driving hundreds of thousands of young Nepalis to seek work abroad each year in the absence of sufficient domestic opportunities. This outward migration has entrenched the country's dependence on remittances, which, according to Nepal Rastra Bank, account for nearly a quarter of the national GDP.

At the same time, Nepal's vulnerability to climate change is becoming increasingly pronounced. Frequent floods, landslides, and emerging glacial risks are placing growing pressure on livelihoods, infrastructure, and local economies. Compounding these challenges are ongoing governance constraints, ranging from limited institutional capacity to persistent gaps in service delivery, which continue to affect all tiers of government and hinder the effective implementation of development initiatives.

The current Government of Nepal's reform-oriented agenda reflects a growing recognition that incremental progress is no longer sufficient. What is required is systemic transformation: stronger institutions, improved accountability, innovation in public service delivery, and deeper collaboration between state and non-state actors. Federalism has created new opportunities for localized governance, but it has also exposed capacity gaps at provincial and municipal levels. Bridging these gaps will require not only public sector reform, but also strategic partnerships.

In this evolving context, civic platforms such as Rotary Clubs in Nepal have an opportunity to redefine their role, moving beyond charity to become partners in advancing national development priorities.

Rotary's Mission, Reach, and Misconceptions

In Nepal, Rotary is often perceived as an exclusive club of affluent individuals, meeting in expensive hotels, organizing social events, and operating at a distance from everyday development realities. While fellowship is a visible aspect of Rotary culture, this perception overlooks the organization's core identity as a global volunteer service network.

Rotary comprises more than 1.2 million members across over 200 countries and regions, united by a mission to provide service, promote integrity, and advance goodwill and peace. In Nepal, Rotary Clubs operate through International District 3292 (covering Nepal and Bhutan), with more than 160 clubs and over 5,000 members engaged in community service.

Rotary's work aligns closely with Nepal's development priorities. Its global areas of focus; disease prevention, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, education, economic development, peacebuilding, and environmental sustainability mirror many of the country's most pressing needs. From installing drinking water systems in rural districts to supporting maternal health initiatives and education programs, Rotary Clubs have consistently contributed to grassroots development.

What distinguishes Rotary, however, is not just what it does, but how it operates. Its members include professionals from diverse fields, engineers, doctors, educators, entrepreneurs, and development practitioners. They bring technical expertise alongside a commitment to service. At the same time, Rotary's global network provides access to funding mechanisms such as The Rotary Foundation Global Grants, as well as international partnerships and best practices. This dual identity, local presence combined with global connectivity positions Rotary as a unique development actor in Nepal.

From Charity to Systems Change

Historically, Rotary's contributions in Nepal have focused on addressing immediate community needs. School construction, free health camps, disaster response, and water supply projects have improved lives across the country. These efforts, often delivered quietly, reflect a strong culture of service.

However, Nepal's current development challenges are systemic. They require solutions that go

beyond isolated, short-term interventions. Addressing governance inefficiencies, improving service delivery systems, strengthening local economies, and building climate resilience demand coordinated, long-term engagement. This calls for a shift in Rotary's approach, from charity-driven activities to systems-oriented interventions.

Rotary's seven areas of focus provide a strong foundation for this transition. By aligning projects with municipal and provincial development plans, Rotary Clubs can help scale impact and ensure sustainability. For instance, rather than conducting one-off health camps, clubs can support local health systems through training, preventive care programs, and improved outreach. Instead of standalone school projects, Rotary can partner with municipalities to improve learning outcomes, teacher capacity, and digital access. Such an approach transforms Rotary from a service provider into a systems enabler.

Bridging the Gap Between Policy and Practice

One of Nepal's most persistent development challenges is the gap between policy formulation and implementation. Policies are often well-articulated at the federal level, but their execution at subnational levels faces challenges due to limited capacity, weak coordination, and resource constraints.

Rotary Clubs can play a catalytic role in bridging this gap. Their members' professional expertise and community credibility position them to support local governments in translating policy into action. There are already examples of this potential. In several municipalities, Rotary-led initiatives have contributed to improved sanitation, strengthened school infrastructure, and enhanced community health outreach. These interventions demonstrate how civic organizations can complement government efforts by providing technical support, mobilizing resources, and fostering community engagement. Globally, Rotary's role in polio eradication offers a compelling example. Through sustained collaboration with governments and international organizations such as WHO and UNICEF, Rotary has helped reduce polio cases by over 99 percent since 1988. This model of long-term, partnership-driven engagement provides valuable lessons for Nepal, particularly in areas such as immunization, disease prevention, and public health systems strengthening.

Resilience in Action: Lessons from the Earthquake

The 2015 Gorkha earthquake was a defining moment for Nepal. It exposed the country's vulnerabilities but also demonstrated its capacity for resilience and collective action. In the aftermath, Rotary Clubs in Nepal, supported by international partners, mobilized quickly. They contributed to rebuilding schools, health posts, and community infrastructure in some of the hardest-hit districts, including Sindhupalchok and Gorkha.

What made these efforts particularly impactful was their emphasis on quality and sustainability. Reconstruction projects incorporated improved building standards, community participation, and accountability mechanisms. These initiatives complemented the government's National Reconstruction Authority and highlighted the value of partnerships between civic organizations and the state.

As climate risks intensify, this model of collaborative resilience-building becomes increasingly relevant. Rotary can play a role in supporting community-based adaptation, disaster preparedness, and climate-resilient infrastructure.

Strengthening Health Systems and Community Well-being

Nepal faces a dual health burden: persistent infectious diseases alongside a rising prevalence of non-communicable diseases such as diabetes and cardiovascular conditions. While access to healthcare has improved, disparities remain, particularly in rural and underserved areas.

Rotary's experience in community health provides a strong entry point for supporting national health reforms. In Nepal, Rotary Clubs have supported vaccination campaigns, organized medical outreach programs, and raised awareness about preventive health practices. Going forward, the opportunity lies in strengthening systems rather than delivering parallel services. Rotary can support local health institutions through capacity building, health education, and integration of community-based approaches into formal health systems.

Investing in Education and Human Capital

Education is central to Nepal's long-term development, yet quality remains a significant challenge. National assessments have shown that many students struggle with foundational literacy and numeracy, even after several years of schooling.

Rotary's contributions to education through school infrastructure, scholarships, and literacy programs are well established. The next step is to focus on quality and innovation. This includes supporting teacher training, promoting digital learning, and piloting community-based education models that can be scaled through government systems.

Similarly, investments in water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) remain critical for both health and education outcomes. Rotary-supported projects in districts such as Dolakha and Ramechhap have demonstrated that combining infrastructure with community engagement leads to more sustainable results.

Unlocking Economic Opportunities for Youth

Nepal's demographic profile presents both a challenge and an opportunity. With a large and

growing youth population, the country must generate sufficient economic opportunities to harness this potential. Currently, many young Nepalis seek employment abroad due to limited domestic prospects. While remittances provide economic stability, long-term development requires stronger local economies.

Rotary's network of business and professional leaders can contribute to this agenda. Clubs can support vocational training, mentorship, entrepreneurship, and small enterprise development. By partnering with local governments and the private sector, Rotary can help create localized economic ecosystems that generate employment and reduce dependence on migration.

A Strategic Partner for Reform

Nepal's development challenges are complex and interconnected. Addressing them requires collaboration across sectors and actors. Government alone cannot deliver systemic transformation; it must be supported by capable and credible partners.

Rotary's unique strengths, its local presence, professional expertise, and global connectivity position it as one such partner. However, realizing this potential requires a shift in mindset, both within Rotary and among external stakeholders. Rotary must increasingly align its initiatives with national and local development priorities, adopt a more strategic approach to partnerships, and focus on measurable impact. At the same time, government institutions should recognize and engage Rotary as a development partner, rather than viewing it solely as a charitable organization. Reframing Rotary's role is therefore essential. It is not an exclusive social club, but a platform for service, leadership, and problem-solving. Its true value lies in its ability to connect people, ideas, and resources to address complex challenges. As Nepal advances its reform agenda, Rotary Clubs have an opportunity to step into a more transformative role, working alongside government not just to respond to immediate needs, but to strengthen systems and shape long-term solutions.

The shift from charity to systems change is not merely an evolution in approach. It is a necessary step toward achieving meaningful, sustained, and inclusive development in Nepal.

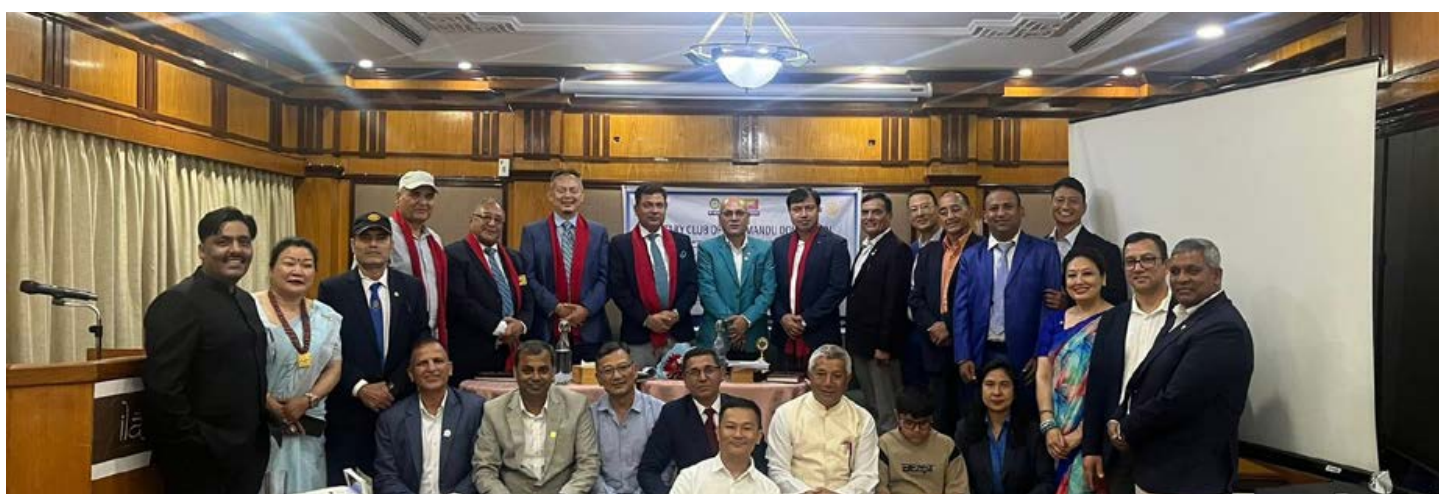

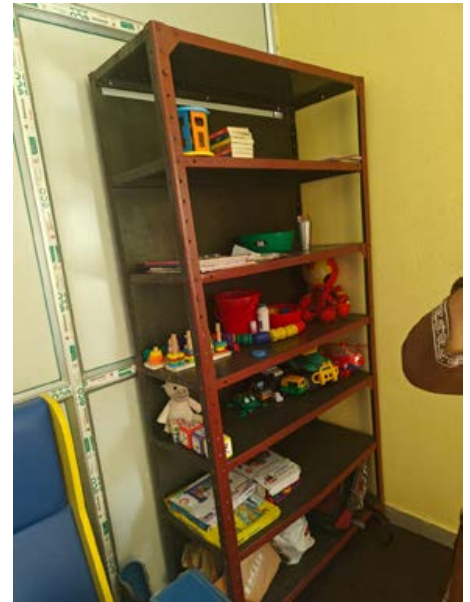

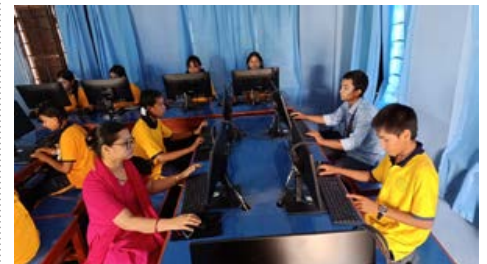

Seven Rotarians and five Anns participated in the program, which was implemented at a total cost of Rs. 22,650. The initiative reflected Rotary's spirit of fellowship, compassion, and commitment to supporting vulnerable members of the community through meaningful humanitarian service.
